SPCA Divides Time Between Dogs and Cats

A total of 73,594 animals -consisting for the most part of dogs and catswere handled by the Los Angeles SPCA and Southern California Humane Society during the calendar year 1961, according to a report by George Crosier, general manager of the society. This includes adoptions, homeless animals which were sheltered, unwanted pets picked

During the past year, 325 animals-dogs, cats, birds, and several types of wild life-were also rescued by the society from various precarious situations. In the main, says Crosier, dogs are inclined to be trapped in ditches or drainpipes; cats generally require rescuing from tall trees into which they have climed for safety, but from which they are afraid to descend.

INVESTIGATIONS

Zoos, stables, poultry operations, slaughter and action houses, and pet shops were the subjects for the SPCA's 1,548 investigations during the year 1961. These affected a total of 166,763

Additional activity during '61 included animal protection and rescue work during the Hollywood, Bel-Air Brentwood, Topanga, and Kagel Canyon fires, at which time Crosier and his officers assisted a large but unrecorded number of pets and wild creatures.

In carrying out its duties last year, the society's vehicles traveled 243,537 miles, Crosier concluded.
