El Camino Riding Fence Between Victory, Defeat

Underway on a string of showdown Metropolitan Conference clashes that will either whisk it to the top of the basketball heap or sink it into oblivion, El Camino College traveled to East Los Angeles Tuesday.

It was at the current point in the schedule in the first round that the Warriors dipped into a disastrous slump which sent them reeling from a first-place tie into a third-place deadlock.

East Los Angeles started the string of defeats in the first round by licking the Tribe in a one-sided encounter.

From that point, ECC slid steadily downhill, blowing contests to valley and San Diego, breaking the string of whippings only with a decision over Long Beach.

PICKING Since the beginning of the second round, however, El Camino has managed to find the victory trail once again, lapping Harbor down in the opener and giving Santa Monica City College its twenty-second consecutive defeat on Tuesday.

Paul Ingelman slipped off the bench to can 20 points and pace all ECC scorers as the Tribe moved to a 43-35 halftime lead, increased the margin to 24 points at one time after intermission, and finally wound up with an 81-65 victory.

Scoring in splurges, the Indians took control of the contest shortly after the opening tip-off and even before halftime, Coach George Stanich was substituting freely.

Midway through the second period, EC mentor Stanich pulled all the first-stringers and the substitutes finished the game for the Warriors, holding the Corsairs even for the most part.

Sensational Ed Cadis, dead from the outside, paced all scorers by dropping in 22 points for the Santa Monicans. The 5-8 Corsair forward was unstoppable from the 15-25 foot regions, and his fantastic dribbling time and again tied the Warriors into knots.

"NO PATSY" East LA is no patsy as league-leading Valley found out Tuesday, when the Monarchs were forced to overhaul the Huskies in the second half before coming away with a scalp-raising three-point win.

Even in defeat, the Huskies were a rugged ball club as Felix Patterson, dropping in 23 points, kept the under-

dogs in the contest until the final minutes.

Currently gunning at a 19.0 per game average, Patterson was instrumental in the Huskies' first-round victory over Camino. His outside shooting, proved too much for the Tribe to handle.

Louis Hood and Louis Conde, both averaging in double figures, add support to the unstoppable Patterson.

Camino is no slouch in the scoring department either with four of the starting five hitting in double figures, against conference competition. Dan Karavas led the Indians with a 16.5 average. Ron Dinnel, Mike Schrader and Keith Erickson are also burning enemy buckets at a double-figure clip.

Two newcomers will appear on the football coaching staff of El Camino College next fall, following action taken this week by the college Board of Trustees.

Named as assistants to Coach Ken Swearingen by the college board were Vince McCullough, head football coach at Redondo High School for the past several years, and Bill Vincent, an El Camino alumnus and football coach at Aviation High School.

McCullough will handle backfield coaching chores for the Warriors, while Vincent will specialize on the line. Rounding out the grid coaching crew is Don Jurk, who will tutor ends.

With the addition of Vincent, the ECC football staff boasts three returning alums—Jurk, Vincent, and Head Coach Swearingen, named in November to assume the post vacated with the death of Norm Verry.

Retiring from the grid sidelines is Doug Essick, who requested fulltime duty in the instructional program of the physical education department. Essick, who took therein as head coach immediately following Coach Verry's illness, led the team through a highly respectable season. The former USC grid great also served for many years as head baseball coach.

In addition to his football duties, Vincent will assist Ray Southstone as track coach and both new coaches will instruct classes in health and physical education.

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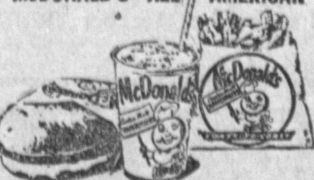


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
