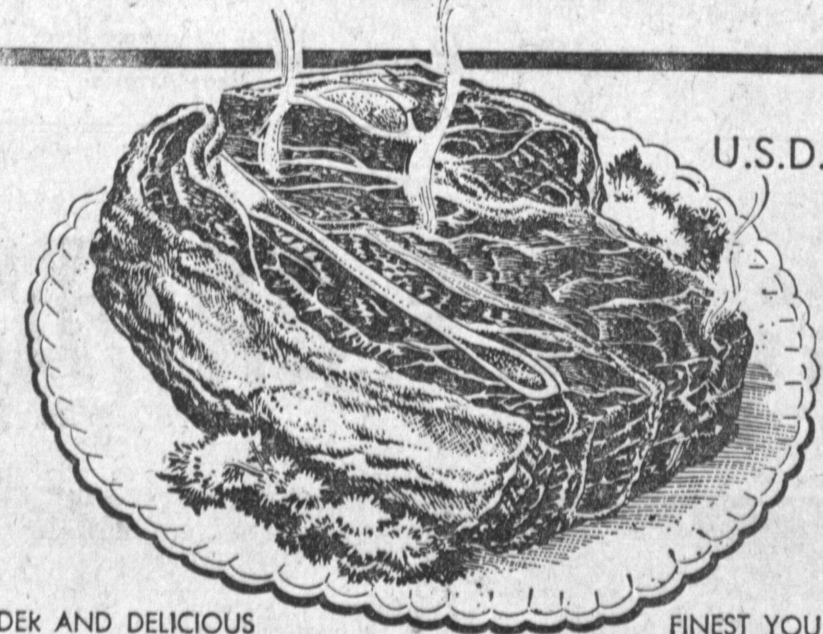

ATTRACTIVE PICTURES

Transparent vases and translucent glassware on window shelves make very attractive color pictures. Almost any exposure is sure to produce pleasing results, and fill-in flash can be used to lighten the shadows. Even though you make your picture indoors, you must use daylight-type film because of the window light. Use a large lens opening and shoot from a low point to prevent the background from being distracting.

SNOW SCENES

When using color film your camera this winter, try to avoid overexposing sunlit snow scenes. Except when the snow is covered with a glistening crust, such pictures need an exposure of about 1/50 second at f/8. Backlighting snow scenes require an exposure of 1/50 second with a lens opening of f/11. A kodak Skylight filter may be used to relieve the excessive bluishness found in shadow areas.
