Warrior Nine Coach Hopes For Top Year

"If pitching holds up and defense remains steady, we may have a fine year," El Camino baseball mentor, Chuck Freeman observes with caution.

Freeman may have appeared cautious before, but after the scholastic ineligibility of three of his best men and the Kansas City acquisition of brilliant shortstop Herb Newman, he has every right to display extreme conservatism in his outlook.

"I'm only hoping they will show their potential," Freeman said of his hurling crew.

Though not as powerful as last year's team, ECC's '62 squad may cheat its way to the top via defense alone.

The Warriors boast a steady infield with Pete Banulin, Morningside, guarding the gateway; Bob Withers, Mira Costa, on the pivot spot, and John Ranslem, Serra, handling the hot corner at third.

SHORT STOP

Bob Brown, Morningside, will step into Herb Newman's shoes to flag down the ball at short.

On reserve for infield work are two top-notch glove men in Ed Beckwith, San Francisco, and Nick Fuscardo of Serra.

Four men will vie for starting berths in the outfield. Speed and accuracy will be the key words for the ECC outer gardeners.

Joe Moore, Serra; Rel James, Gardena; Bob Pier, Morningside, and Frank Van Patten, Torrance, will battle for starts.

Moore was a regular outfielder last year and boasts plenty of power. James is a jack-of-all-trades and can double just about anywhere. Pier packs plenty of speed, a fine arm, and a .400 batting average while Van Patten should develop into a top-notch lead-off man.

Pitching will be the Warriors' do or die rallying point. Several top-ranked hurlers make up the hill corps—all rookies except for Ted Sprague, ECC's outstanding pitcher of '61.

John Torok has the potential of becoming a big winner, while Jerry Smith possesses a fast ball that makes major league scouts sit up and take notice—and notes. Rounding out the mound crew are Steve Parents, Dick King, Lance Valatch, Skip Parente, and Ray Wilson.

Warriorville is exactly three-deep in catchers.

Dick Green will probably open the season as ECC backstop with Ron Schneider and Ken Proctor in reserve.

Green played in the shadow of Angel property Dave Marsden last year. Once out from beneath the shadow he may develop into an excellent receiver.



Proctor is quick with his hands and hustles behind the plate.

Harbor JC Hawks Near End of Court Season

Right in the middle of the league standings is where Harbor College's cagers find themselves as they approach the last two weeks of basketball competition.

With a 5-5 mark in league play, the Seahawks are not title contenders but they can have a big influence on the league race as they meet the league leaders.

In the past week they beat Long Beach 80-68, but lost to San Diego 64-81 in the border city to remain where they started at the .500 mark. The Seahawks were to meet Santa Monica on Tuesday in Santa Monica and then return to the Harbor gym to play Bakersfield Friday night. Bakersfield currently is in second place, one game behind league leading L.A. Valley, whom the Seahawks play next week.

In the first round Santa Monica lost to the Hawks in an overtime thriller. Coach Norm Kettering is hoping that this is not the time the Corsairs decide to win their first game of the 1962 season. In their first meeting the Bakersfield Renegades defeated the Hawks decisively.

Against Long Beach it was the 25 point efforts of Hollis Lee that made the difference. The 27 points Windfeldt scored against San Diego were not enough to overcome the 28 of Dell plus the 23 of Mathis and the 16 of Catlin. A hot second half in which the Knights scored 45 points to the Hawks 30 gave them the victory.

County Employs Designer for Two Area Golf Links

Responding to Supervisor Kenneth Hahn's urging that the county develop its unimproved golf sites so they can be used for recreation and return a net revenue to the county, the Board of Supervisors Tuesday took the first step in the development of two of the eight proposed courses.

William F. Bell, well known as one of the nation's top golf course architects, was hired to assist the County Engineer in the development of the proposed Diamond Bar course near Pomona and the Victoria Park course at 190th street and Avalon boulevard (Dominquez area).

Under terms of the agreement under which Bell was hired, he will prepare routing plans, develop improvement criteria and prepare large scale contour drawings of each green. These will be used by the County Engineer and his staff in preparing working drawings.
