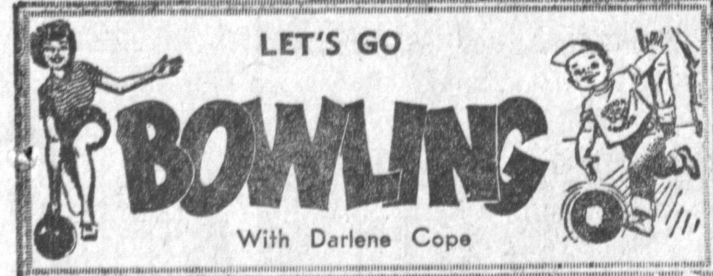

Torrance Youth Baseball Organizations Launch Season; Start Tryouts Saturday

With the close of basketball season last weekend, Torrance youngsters have dusted off unused baseball equipment in preparation for the coming Spring horsehide practice sessions.

Majority of the community's Little League and youth baseball organizations are currently recruiting teams for the season. Tryouts, in most cases will be

held in early March.

According to Harvey Casson, publicity director for the Torrence Colt League, his organization will hold a general meeting at Edison School on Feb. 26, 7:30 p.m. League tryouts will be held at North Torrence High School, March 3 and 10, from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m.

Mel Miller, president of the Torrence Babe Ruth League this week announced that there are still openings for 14 and 15 year olds. Registration of 13, 14 and 15 year old youngsters will be accepted at the league's third tryout session this Saturday, March 3, from 9 a.m. until 2 p.m. at the Plaza Del Amo and Western Ave. baseball field.

Russ Pausch, president of the North Torrence Pony League, reported that the league will hold its final registration, along with tryouts of all boys that are signed up, on Saturday, 10 a.m. at Garrett Field, 190th and Arlington. In the event of rain, he said, tryouts will be held on Saturday, March 10.

Construction work has

started on the new field and anyone wishing to lend a hand will be welcome.

Joe Schwiery, publicity director for the Pacific Coast Little League, stated that tryouts will be held March 3 and 10 at South High School's diamond. An alternate date of March 17 has been set up if either of the two dates are rained out. Schedule includes: 12 year olds, 9-10 a.m.; 11 year olds, 10-11 a.m.; 10 year olds, 11 a.m. to 12 noon; nine year olds, 1:30 to 3 p.m.; and eight year olds, 3-4:30 p.m. Youngsters not already registered are requested to bring proof of birth.

Another major inexperience problem rests with Coach Chuck Greene of El Camino. Only one letterman, a good one in Ted Sprague, is on the mound corps, but three freshmen—John Torok (Serra), Jerry Smith (Aviation) and Dick King (El Segundo)—compiled first-rate high school records last year. 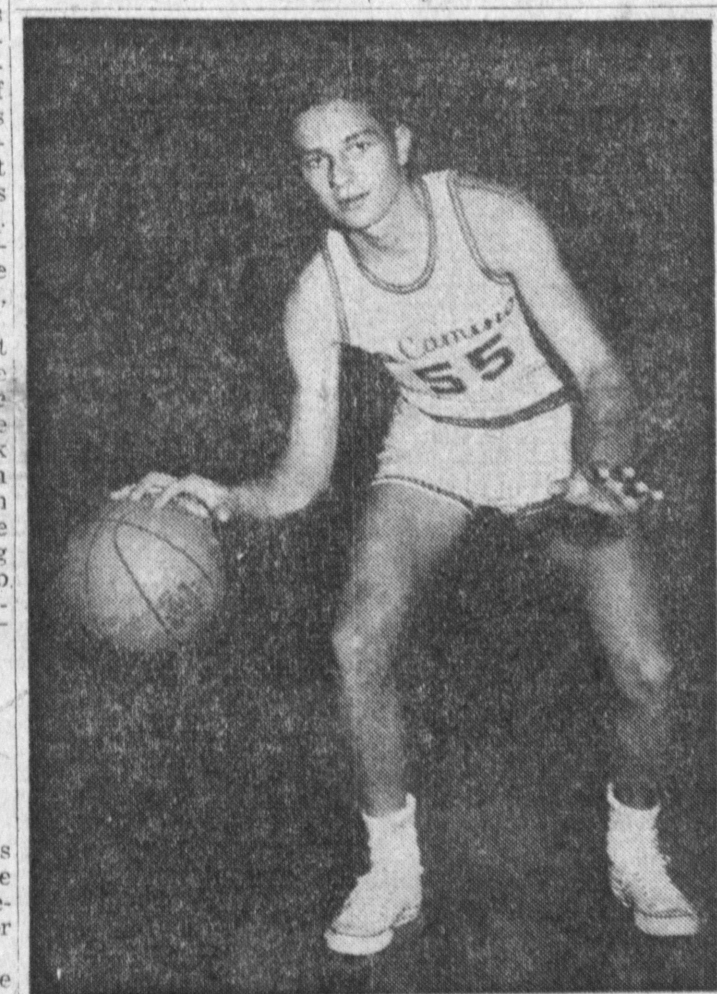

Area Will be Considered As 1968 Olympic Location

Supervisors have been assured by the United States Olympic Association, Inc., that Los Angeles will receive "careful consideration" as a prospective site for the 1968 Olympics.

K. L. Wilson, president of the association headquartered in New York, wrote the assurance in response to a Board of Supervisors resolution which called for an all-out drive to bring the Olympic Games to Los Angeles County.

Supervisor Kenneth Hahn, senior member and past president of the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum Commission, pointed out when he introduced the resolution Jan. 16:

the place to hold the 1968 olympics because it is now the sports capital of the world and has the finest facilities in the world for the Games."

He cited the adaptability of Los Angeles' two great sports centers—the Coliseum and the Coliseum Center. William Nicholas, Coliseum manager, has no doubt that the Coliseum mission has \$400,000 in reserve funds which could be used in promoting the games.

"I believe we can get the Olympic Games for 1968 and the 1964 trials here if press, radio, television and the public get behind an all-out drive," Supervisor Hahn said.
