the county's Clifton beach, which adjoins Torrance beach, was authorized Tuesday when the Board of Supervisors, on the motion of Burton W. Chace, agreed to accept 25,000 cubic yards of excess sand from a nearby

Board called for bids to move the sand to the beach

This will augment the placement of 100,000 cubic yards of sand which the county recently acquired free of charge from another local company.

At that time, county buildings and service roads valued at \$100,000 were in jeopardy because of erosion.

According to County Engineer John A. Lambie, the material is "very high in quality, being original beach sand of large median diameter, with very little dirt binder. Therefore, only a small initial loss will occur from washing out of this finé material by wave action," Lambie concluded.

Chace said placement of the latest yardage will add at least another five years to the life of the present restoration project and will enhance the life and use of the county beach.

Two Torrance area men were among the 95 passengers and crew members who perished Thursday morning in a tragic New York plane

Chief Pilot James H. Heist, 58, of 9 Blackwater Canyon Road, Rolling Hills, and Co-pilot Michael Barna; 34, of 1200 Via Gabriel. Palos Verdes Estates, were at the controls of the American Airlines jetliner when it crashed on takeoff.

Plane was en route, nonstop, for Los Angeles International Airport.

Majority of passengers aboard were from either Los Angeles or New York areas.

Observers said that the plane successfully lifed into the air, faltered, then plunged into Jamaica Bay.
