League of Women Voters Elects Officers for Provisional Term

Mrs. Albert Nadel was elected president of the newly formed Provisional League of Women Voters of Torrance at the group's organization meeting recently in Torrance's City Council chambers.

Other officers selected to serve during the provisional period were Mrs. Donald Brink, first vice president; Mrs. Lee Bower, second vice president; Mrs. Gene Mabry, secretary; Mrs. Manfred Doser, treasurer; and directors, Mmes. Marshall Cox, M. B. T. Davies, Milton Feinberg, William Geissert, C. K. Howey, S. R. Saunders, and Robert R. Christensen.

History of the league, its purposes, and place in the community were outlined for new members and guests by Mrs. Melzar Jones, advisor to the Torrance League.

SUFFRAGE

Mrs. Jones pointed out that the national League of Women Voters was a direct outgrowth of the Women's Suffrage movement, and a desire by women to use their vote effectively and intelligently. "The League is a non-partisan organization," she stated, "and operates on the basis of study, discussion, and action." Mrs. Jones stressed that membership in

the league is open to all women of voting age, whether they wish to work actively in the group or merely become better informed on governmental issues.

Torrance's history, growth, economic, and social conditions were discussed by a panel composed of Mmes. Brink, Cox, Emery Reeves, David Lyman, and C. R. Berwanger. Mrs. Brink pointed out that these findings will be used as background for a future community analysis in greater depth.

Morning and evening study groups will be set up in mid-March, with times dependent on members' preferences, according to Mrs. Christensen, membership chairman. The state's role in local government will be the initial study topic for the units.
