## Blount Promises End to Zoning Discrimination

Favoritism in zoning will end if Willys Blount is elected as mayor, he promises. He is studying possibility of more stringent legislation to end zoning discrimination.

Blount is critical that no standards are followed consistently in granting permission for rezoning and variances. Presently a person's property right are too often left to the whims of the City Council and Planning Commission, he charges.

"I would favor a comprehensive study by a citizens' committee, preferably a group of men and women

who have no axe to grind in real estate," Blount stated. "The duty of the committee would be to study the Torrance zoning laws and report to the council if there is any way of doing a good job for the city and at the same time avoid hurting a taxpayer who may desire to add a room or improve his property in some other manner."

#### OPPOSED

"I'm opposed to hodge-podge construction or development," Blount said, "but I would fight equally hard to prevent favoring one person over another in similar zoning problems."

Blount pointed out that he can see no reason for allowing one person to build in a low drainage area and forbidding a second one the same privilege. He said it is his candid opinion that any type of problem should be corrected before anyone is given a right to build within the city limits of Torrance.

Blount pointed out there have been instances in which one person was allowed a multiple unit, and the homeowner next door restricted to an R-1 zoning.
