Grim Battle Developing for City Clerk, Treasurer Posts

over the coming municipal election for three city councilmen and a mayor has blown a smokescreen that has obscured another battle on the April 10 ballot.

Two other city positions on the ballot, city clerk and city treasurer, are equally important but are getting virtually no publicity.

A grimly determined battle for these two posts is developing, with each of the candidates outlining platforms where no platform ever existed before.

Candidates have noted that these are ELECTED positions and that the contenders who win will be responsible to the voters and not to other city of-

Contestants for these two positions have some interesting points to make. But they have been overlooked in the series of meetings and coffee klatches called to get the opinions and stands of other candidates for election.

Considered as "part-time" jobs in the past, majority of candidates feel that growth of the city makes full-time application to the job mandatory.

Positions were established when Torrance was little more than a village and the duties of the post were light. Phenomenal growth of the city has increased the importance of the positions tremendously, although salaries paid have not increased proportionally.

One unique factor in the campaign for these positions is that none of the candidates wishes to conduct the office as it has been conducted before. Each has ideas for improving the efficiency of the office, ideas for saving the taxpayer money, ideas for making the post truly representative of voter opin-

The struggle for council positions is noisier and more expensive, but, for a good view of grassroots American politics in action, keep an eye on the battle for the two lesser posts.
