Airman Adams, who has completed his basic military training here, was selected for the advanced course on the basis of his interests and aptitudes.

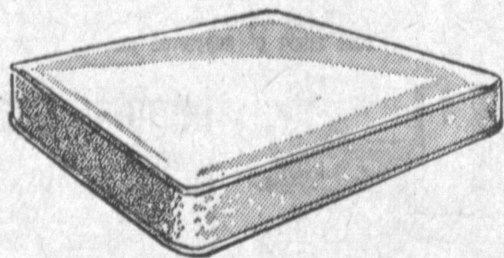

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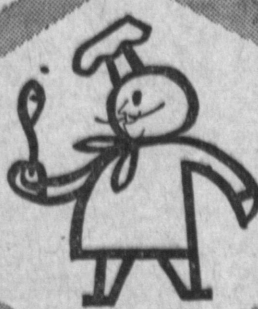
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
