Crusade Chairman for Torrance Notes Year-Long Celebration

The April Cancer Crusade of the American Cancer Society's Los Angeles County Branch will be dedicated to observance of Cancer Progress Year, it was announced recently by H. P. "Buck" Atherton, District Eight Crusade chairman. Atherton is manager of the Security First National Bank of Torrance.

"Cancer Progress Year," he explained, "is a joint celebration of the American Cancer Society and the federal government's National Cancer Institute, commemorating the 25th anniversary of the N.C.I. and the 25th anniversary of the society's first nationwide educational campaign against cancer."

He said that objectives of the year-long anniversary celebration will be to "report to the public on where science now stands in cancer research; intensify the efforts being made to persuade the public to act for its own protection; improve the care of the cancer patient; and step up all programs to speed the final victory over cancer."

ATTACK

The current nationwide research attack on cancer is the greatest ever mounted against any disease, according to Atherton. Because of its concentration of large and modern universities, California is in the front lines of the cancer war. The American Cancer Society, for example, has \$1,781,492 in current research grants now being carried out at twenty institutions in this state.

Atherton pointed out that the American Cancer Society was the first voluntary health agency to direct major research activity against disease. Today it is the leading voluntary health organization in the nation, administering the bulk of private funds devoted to cancer and leukemia research.

The Society's educational and fund raising Cancer Crusade will kick off here on Monday, April 2. Recruiting is now under way, according to Atherton, and persons interested in assisting the campaign are invited to call the society at OR 2-8138.
