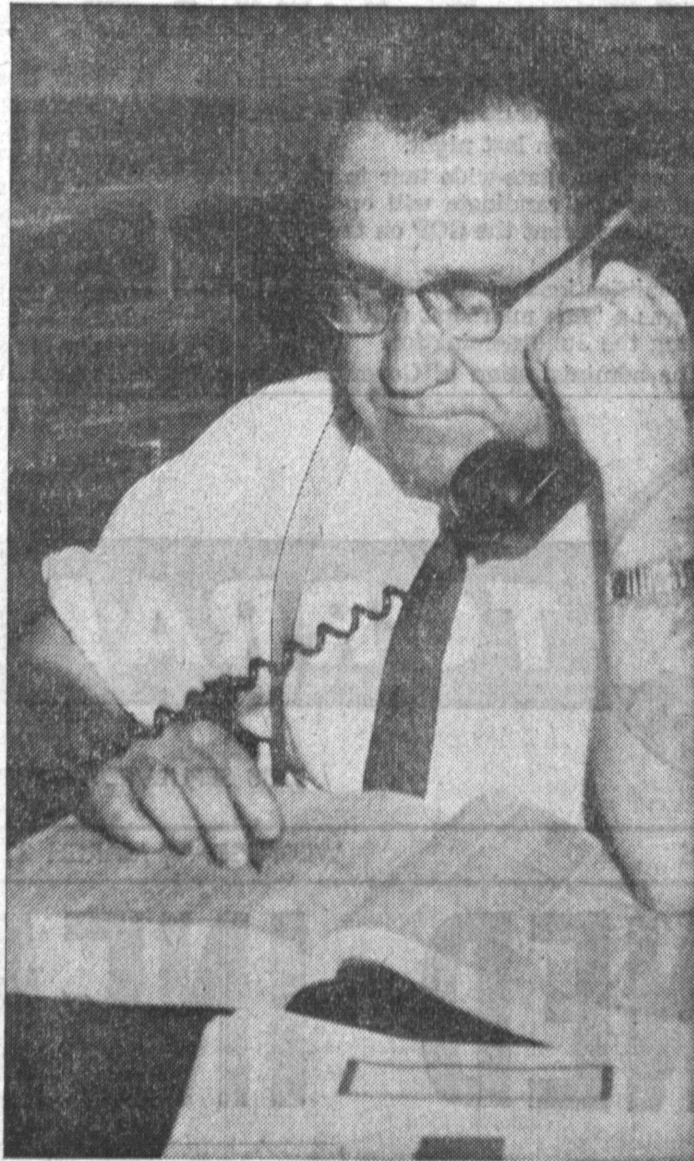

Parks, City Auditorium On Candidate's Platform

Councilman J. A. Beasley, incumbent candidate for the post, this week stressed the need for a community auditorium and an increase in recreational facilities in Torrance.

Beasley pointed out that land for three badly needed new playgrounds is available and should be utilized before it is converted into industrial, commercial or residential use.

An eight-point program of vitally needed projects was

outlined by the councilman. In a statement announcing his platform for reelection, he said:

"I have fought, just as I promised, for these needed community improvements. My platform, simple as it seems, will be to continue the fight. It has been an uphill battle but success is in sight."

NEEDS

Beasley said that, in addition to the playgrounds and the auditorium, the commu-

nity needs: Recreation buildings at Las Arboles, Paradise and La Romeria park sites, new fire stations in West Torrance and North Torrance, industrial and commercial development of the municipal airport so that additional revenues will relieve overburdened taxpayers, a library and another park for North Torrance.

"My term in office has seen completion of many of the projects I have worked for," the councilman said. "These include elimination of almost all of our overhead traffic lights, tearing out parking meters, street and highway improvements, park developments and start

of construction on a new Torrance library."

"Our construction program is now well underway," Beasley concluded. "Our program for the next four years will be to keep it going."

Councilman Beasley, who seeks reelection for a second term on the council, is the only incumbent for the three posts that will be vacated. Councilman Willys Blount will run for mayor.
