## Rosemary DeCamp To Autograph Book

There is a point in the lives of actresses where they feel a compelling urge to write, and the product is usually a few hundred pages of lackluster—or lurid—memoirs.

When Rosemary DeCamp was touched by the lure of print she quite characteristically wrote, not an autobiography, but a children's book. But in all fairness to Rosemary the actress, her children's book is autobiographical. Titled "Here, Duke," it has just been published by David McKay Co. Inc. of New York.

Her own experience with a handsome and roguish Irish setter that she and her family acquired from the S.P.C.A. and were taken in by, provided the idea for the new book. In it she recounts Duke's escapades in eleven appealing stories, using a nine-year-old child (not unlike her nine-year-old, Tina) as Duke's foil.
