



Journalism Award For 3 NHS Students

Three North High School students have received journalism awards in two recent writing contests for high school journalism students.

First place trophy for news writing was awarded to Frances Whiteman and an honorable mention certificate to Joanne Huss at the 9th annual El Camino Press Day.

The key address of the press day was delivered by Rear Admiral W. C. Chambliss USN (Ret.) to the over 200 South Bay area students attending. All students competed in either news, feature, editorial or sports writing.

Sandra Peterson won a tenth place award in editorial competition at the 11th annual National Association of Journalism Directors writing contest held at Canoga Park.

Lynne Hanson and Toni Sheets placed in the semifinals in the same category.

Over 400 Los Angeles area journalism students attended. All competed in news writing and then competed in either feature, editorial or sports.

Strawberry Harvest Starts in Torrance April 1

Weather permitting, the strawberry harvest season will expect to start in the Torrance, Gardena, Welteria and Dominguez area about April 1.

Several hundred qualified pickers will be needed in this area. Growers prefer men and women who live locally and who will stay on the job until the end of the season, normally the end of July.

Strawberries are a highly perishable crop and must be picked at just the right stage of maturity. Workers in this activity must be willing to work long hours and work Sunday and holidays. The job of picking and sorting all of the strawberry

ing according to size and quality, is not hard or heavy, but it takes several days to become accustomed to working in a kneeling or stooping position all day long.

The prevailing wage in the local area is a \$1 per hour and private transportation is needed to get to near-ly all of the strawberry

fields. Anyone interested in this work should apply at the Torrance Farm Labor Office, 1308 Cravens, Torrance.
