Demand New Trial for Convicted Man

The doughty, 18-year old wife of convicted kidnapper Billy Roman Smith, 21, yesterday pledged a continuing fight to prove that her husband was innocent of the

Sharon Smith, 21927 Harvard St., scored the decision of the court and said that she had instructed her husband's attorney, Robert E. Krause of Long Beach, to seek a new trial on April

In an exclusive interview Thursday with Torrance Press reporters, she took exception to the conduct of

the trial, pointing out that each time one of the alleged offenses was committed her husband had been in the presence of qualified witnesses who had testified at the trial.

When one of the court officials had chosen to call them "alibi witnesses" the jury had apparently ignored their testimony

On one of the occasions, at the exact minute the crime was committed, she said, the defendent had been with a crowd of 13 people celebrating the wedding an-

Each of the persons had testified to this effect at the court hearing.

Referring to the trial as "frontier justice" and "let's give him a quick trial and THEN hang him" proced-ure, Mrs. Smith said that, at one time during the trial, one of the prosecuting officers joked with the jury and "had them doubled up with

"Throwing away the future, and possibly the life. of an innocent man is certainly nothing to laugh about," she said.

Krause stated. "That man is certainly innocent of the charges. Original complaints filed by the victims all said that the suspect was 5'10" tall. weighed about 185 pounds, had dark eyes and long, bushy, black hair. Smith is about 5'5", weighs about 130 pounds has blue eyes, and has worn a crew cut for years.

"Description concerning the gun used in the crimes and the clothing worn by the suspect didn't jibe, either," he said.

Smith, a cook, was arrested by a police stakeout in January. At that time police agencies in the county and city strip were under pressure because of a series of laundromat holdups, kidnappings and assaults. Attorneys for the defense did not discount the possibility that officers might have been "over anxious" to bring in a suspect.
