## Candidate Queries Duties Of Planning Commission

David K. Lyman, Torrance attorney and candidate for Torrance City Council, stated at a meeting of Torrance homeowners that the Torrance Planning Commission was misnamed and did not perform any planning function but rather was a body that passed on zoning matters.

Lyman stated that an attempt has been made by some city officials to create the impression that the so called Planning Commission was staffed with people expert in community planning. This is not true. A city planner is an individual who has a background in engineering and architecture and has studied the many theories of community development. The City of Torrance is in dire need of this type of assistance.

Lyman continued that the first step to correct the situation would be to name the Planning Commission what it is—a Zoning Commission. Then the planning phase, which at present is not being performed, could be handled by people who are expert in their field. A true planning commission should be made up of experts who act in an advisory capacity, making recommendations to the zoning commission or the city council.
