
other in public and in paid political advertising. We urge our readers to overlook this regretable



OUR MEASURES

Press Lists Stand On Special Issues

In addition to the 40 candidates for public office which will be listed on the ballot Tuesday, voters will lso be asked to decide on four special measures.

In the first measure, a proposal to issue revenue oonds, totaling \$1,225,000 for the purpose of acquisiion, construction and financing additions to the Torance Municipal Airport, the Torrance Press finds itelf in unanimous support.

The fact that these are REVENUE bonds, which re required to pay themselves off from increased trerenue from the airport, are the deciding factor. Always tax conscious, the Press would not endorse a neasure of this sort that would hike the tax load.

Measure number two, which provides that money n the city's "Airport Fund" be used for the payment of principal and interest on the revenue bonds, we also favor as a logical and sound follow-through of the ïrst measure.

'LAME DUCK'

Measure number three, an amendment to the harter which would allow newly elected members of he Board of Education to take office shortly after lection, the Press has long favored.

This will eliminate the "lame duck" session on he board and will also eliminate possibility of defeatd incumbents holding the office for several months before the successful candidate takes over.

Measure number four, a charter amendment which would provide for a continuance of the existing ivil service system covering city employees, and which, by a five-sevenths vote, of the city council plus consideration by the civil service commission, allow he council to amend any provisions governing civil ervice, we must disapprove.

We feel that this measure would place too much ower in the hands of the council and would be detructive to good government.
