



The job has taken about A ROO seven months to complete and was built in two sections.

Line A begins at 188th St. and Crenshaw Blvd. and extends south on Crenshaw to 190th St., then east to Van Ness and south on Van Ness to Del Amo Blvd.

Line B starts at an existing drain west of Western Ave. and south of Torrance Blvd., then northwesterly across Torrance Blvd. approximately 150 feet to an existing earth channel.
