Pound-foolish," is very applicable to a situation now existing in the city of Torrance.

Councilmen and the mayor of the city are, under present ordinances, paid a monthly stipend of \$100 a month plus a small proportion of their expenses for what has become virtually a full-time

The combined amount paid to these dedicated city officials offsets only a small percentage of the cost with the balance paid out of their own pockets.

It is past time for us to recognise the sacrifices that these men make in the name of the city. It is certainly enough that they

should give hour after hour of time to the service of the city without having to pay through the nose for the privilege.

Councilmen, by law and by natural inclination, may not raise their own salaries. Any increase in pay for the job must come from the voters and must be carried on the ballot.

A proposal to increase the pittance presently paid to the city fathers would be a worthwhile public service undertaking for one or several of our more active organizations.

While the city of Torrance has been growing by leaps and bounds and the duties of salaried employees of the city have increased proportionally, the councilmen have carefully made sure that these public servants have been adequately paid.

However, it is time that we realize that dedicated and able men are hard to find, and those qualified to run should not be discouraged because they cannot afford to hold the office.




