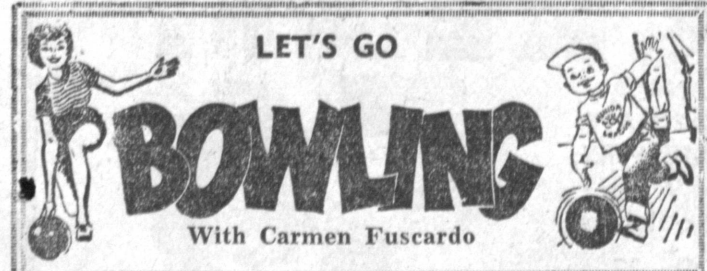

Harbor, San Diego Tied For Metro Baseball Honors

Metropolitan Conference baseball teams take the Easter week off from the tight race to compete in a smattering of holiday tournaments this week.

Last week, Harbor and San Diego remained deadlocked atop the standings with 6-2 records after each winning twice. Bakersfield, the Cinderella team of the conference, won its fifth game in a row after dropping its first three decisions in Metro play. The Renegades are tied with Long Beach for third at 5-3.

The Renegades' courageous comeback last Friday against Long Beach was the highlight of two rounds of action. Long Beach scored eight times in the second inning and led 9-2 going into the bottom of the fifth. But Bakersfield scored four in the fifth and three in the seventh to tie it up. A bases loaded error in the eighth allowed pitcher Ralph Thionet to come in with the winning run, 10-9.

Biggest blow of the week was Harbor's Mike Hubbard, who rocketed a grand slam homer far over the centerfield wall to help the Seahawks stop Long Beach, 9-7. Harbor's hero in its 9-6 win over Valley was shortstop Mark Cutierrez. He got three hits, including a lead-off homer and a two-run triple for three RBIs.

The fourth double winner was East Los Angeles which belted Santa Monica, 8-4, and then rallied to outlast El Camino, 3-1. In the latter game, the Huskies trailed 1-0, tied it up and then went ahead two in the seventh.

County Organizes Lifeguard System for Patrolling Torrance Area Beach Crowds

With an anticipated five per cent increase in beach usage during the 1962 season, Los Angeles County's lifeguard system today was undergoing personnel recruitment to bring the staff up to standard quota of 200 men for the summer.

County Supervisor Burton W. Chace, who represents the beach area of the County, today revealed that the County Department of Parks and Recreation expects the 1961 estimated beach attendance to be exceeded by five per cent.

The record crowds are expected along the 11½ miles of beach frontage over which the county has jurisdiction from the Palos Verdes Peninsula to Zuma Beach.

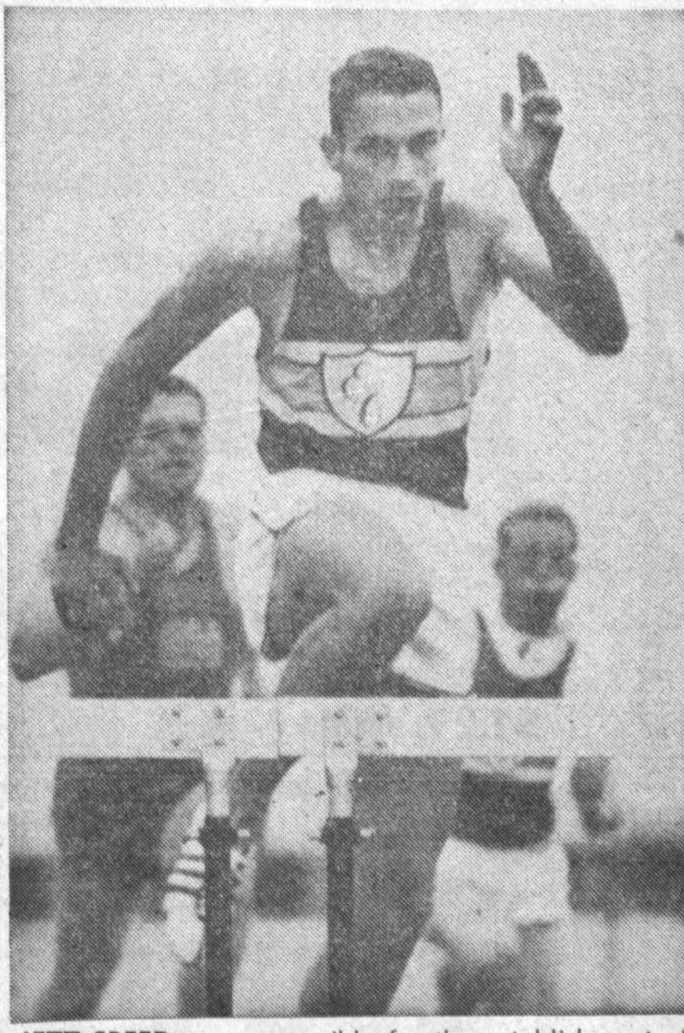
Civil service bulletins were posted today, advising prospective lifeguard applicants to file for open competitive examinations not later than May 4.

APPLICATIONS Bulletins and forms may be obtained from the main county civil service head-

quarters at 222 N. Grand Ave., Los Angeles, or at branch offices in Long Beach at 415 W. Ocean Blvd. Forms and information also may be obtained from county lifeguard headquarters, 1101 Strand, Redondo Beach.

After passing lifeguard requirements, all successful applicants must, after three months of service, obtain a restricted Radiotelephone Operator's Permit issued by the Federal Communications Commission. This will enable them to use all of the radio equipment on boats, vehicles, and at the nine shore stations.

Equipment, including two fast boats, 10 vehicles, observation towers, and personal gear is being placed in readiness for all possible emergencies. Tidal conditions during April, May and June unusually hazardous situations for bathers along the county coast line. With peak attendance anticipated from mid-June to mid-September, the county lifeguards are preparing for the public

El Camino, Harbor Track Squads Drop Twin Meets

While taking a week off from conference competition in observance of Easter Week, Metropolitan Conference track teams are scheduled to compete in the Southern California Relays at Cerritos College this Thursday.

Meanwhile, Valley College, on the threshold of the Metro dual title after whipping Long Beach last week, 72 2/3 to 49 1/3, still has one more tough foe to face in San Diego. The meet is at Valley April 27.

The monarchs stormed past Long Beach with a tremendous show of depth that offset double wins by sprinter Tim Russell and hurdler Terry Hendrix. Valley swept the two-mile, discus and broad jump and got a 48.5 quarter-mile from Dennis Pierce and a 14-5/8 pole vault from Terry Cox.

Bakersfield and San Diego stayed deadlocked in second place by beating East Los Angeles and El Camino, respectively.

San Diego's Bennie Lewis won the 220 in 21.7 and the 440 in 50.5 and teammate Leonard Kary doubled in the hurdles to spark a skinny 62-59 triumph over the Warriors, who got a 4:17.2 mile effort from Mike Thornton. Bakersfield grabbed 10 clearcut first in ripping the Huskies, 78-43.



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
