## Polio Vaccine Shots Available Next Week as Community Service to Area

Polio vaccine shots at \$1 each will be given in Torrance Friday, April 27, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. at St. Philomena School, 21832 Main St.

Sponsoring the community service event are members of St. Philomena School, in cooperation with the March of Dimes.

Mrs. Ellen Hamrysak, chairman of the project, urged parents to protect children and themselves against paralytic polio before the high incidence season in late summer and early fall.

Last year children under

10 years of age accounted for 60 per cent of all paralytic cases in Los Angeles County, it was pointed out. Three properly spaced shots are needed for complete protection, with annual booster shots recommended.

March of Dimes officials declared that with the stepped-up inoculation program now underway, intervals between inoculations should be one month between the first two injections, with the third administered four weeks later.

They pointed out that the new Sabin vaccine will not be generally available in

time to combat polio during the approaching polio season, but that there is no shortage of the effective Salk vaccine, developed through March of Dimes funds.

## Lynn Authors New Resolution to Be Sent to Kennedy

With only one dissenting vote, the Torrance Board of Education at its regular meeting April 16 passed a resolution calling for laws permitting deduction from income tax payments for local school taxes. The resolution was authored by board member Burt Lynn, who stated:

"The LATE (Local Aid to Education) would return control of schools to the local level."

The board plans to send the resolution to members of federal, state and local governing bodies and to national and local educational organizations, service clubs and leading educators.

This is being done in an effort to spread the idea across the nation. One of the envelopes containing the resolution will be addressed to President Kennedy and another to Mr. Ribicoff, who is in charge of the Division of Health, Education and Welfare.

Lynn was prompted to introduce the resolution because he believes that only a portion of the money paid in income taxes eventually finds its way back to the local district.

"By the time it gets back, however," he stated, "about half of it has been gobbled up by the bureaucracies."

Safety training for bus drivers is a short-term course (12 total clock hours) intended to acquaint newly recruited and presently employed school bus drivers with their legal responsibilities under California laws; their moral obligations as a bus driver; theory and practical application of regulations governing passenger management; proper care and operation of buses and their equipment; safety regulations and emergency first aid; requirements for obtaining a school bus driver's license.

## Local Hospital Conducting Monthly Clinic

Little Company of Mary Hospital has announced that it will continue to serve the community by conducting monthly polio clinics as long as a supply of vaccine is available.

A hospital authority stated that it was becoming increasingly difficult to obtain Salk vaccine because of the recent release of the oral vaccine. However, a limited supply has been obtained and the clinics will be held as long as it lasts.

It is expected that the oral vaccine will be available in quantity in the near future and the hospital then plans to participate in a community-wide program of oral immunization.

The next clinic will be held on Thursday, April 26, between 4 and 8 p.m. on the ground floor of the hospital. All persons requiring shots to complete their series of three, as well as those in need of yearly booster, are urged to attend. The charge is \$1 per shot with a maximum of \$5 per family, regardless of the number of shots given.
