## Thirteenth Annual Track-Field Meet Sponsored by Optimists

The 13th annual Torrance Optimist Club Elementary Boys' Track and Field Meet will be held May 5 at Torrance High School.

4. Field events start at 9:30 promptly. Contestants should be on the field at 9:15 to sign in with judges.

5. Lunch will be furnished for participants.

6. Names of contestants must be turned in to C. R. Graybehl, attendance counselor, North High School, by Wednesday, May 2, 4 p.m.

7. No spiked shoes may be worn.

8. Ribbons will be awarded to the first five places in each event.

9. A trophy will be awarded to the school whose team scores the most points. The points will be awarded on a 5-1 basis.

**Chamber Meeting Tuesday Morning At Masonic Lodge**

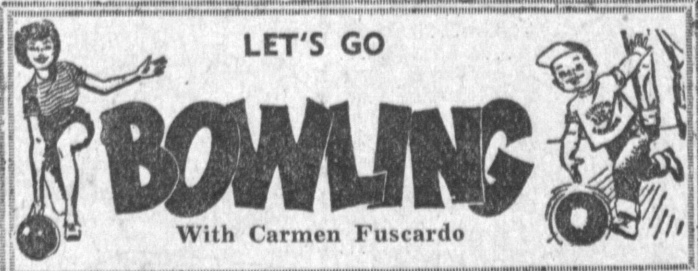

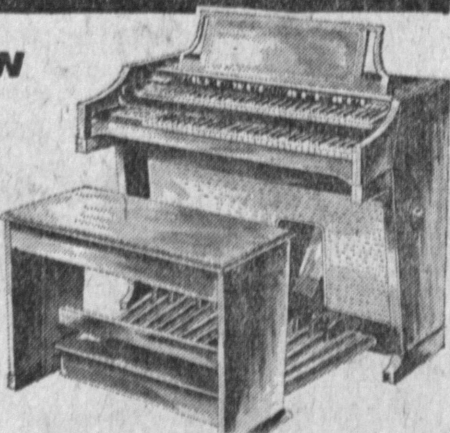
