The attack, as stated by newly elected club president James McDonald of Manhattan Beach, "is part of a concerted effort on our part to improve our methods of learning public speaking."

CRITICISM

President McDonald got the criticism he'd called for from many of the newer members of the club as well as from such long standing toastmasters as Dr. Seaman of Manhattan Beach and Ferdinand Strible of Redondo Beach.

Dr. Seaman stressed that Toastmastering can't merely be fun, but must also be educational, while Strible pointed out that the speech evaluation portions of the programs must be something more than a patting on the backs of fellow members.

SPEECHES

Following the criticism of the program was a series of speeches made by the newly elected officers of the club.

Such officers as administrative vice-president Dr. Wilmet Labit of Welteria; educational vice-president James Riple of Redondo Beach; secretary Don Payne of Torrance; and Sergeant at Arms Colin Dunn of Torrance, spoke in answer to some of the criticism and stated how they planned to make their various offices contribute to the overall aims of the club.

President McDonald ended the evening on the optimistic note of the coming improvements and reminded the members that they were in for an interesting session at the following Wednesday evening's meeting which will feature five member-speakers talking on salesmanship.
