Air Force Airman First Class Clarence R. Evans, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lyle Thompson of 134 219th Pl., Torrance, is participating in "Operation Dominic," the joint Department of Defense-Atomic Energy Commission nuclear test series being conducted in the Pacific.

Airman Evans, a weapons mechanic permanently assigned to Kirtland AFB, N. M., is on temporary duty for the tests.

The airman, who entered the service in January 1954, is married to the former Carolyn K. Morrow of 2710 Santa Monica, Albuquerque, N. M. They have one child.

Operation Dominic is a joint DOD-AEC nuclear test series conducted in the atmosphere over the Pacific Ocean.

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Torrance Area Schools Will Be Built by Bonds

Elementary school facilities in the harbor and south areas will receive major additions and improvements if Los Angeles citizens approve a \$128.8 million bond issue—Propositions A and B—for school constructions at the June 5 election, according to Superintendent of Schools Jack P. Crowther.

Total of 51 projects are earmarked in the 1962 bond proposal for additions and new elementary facilities for an area serviced by the city schools from Rosecrans Boulevard south to San Pedro, according to figures compiled by the system's Public Information Office.

Construction of two new elementary school plants, additional classrooms at 12 existing schools, and various alterations and improvements at many other schools are among projects which will be constructed with bond issue funds in this area.

The alterations and improvement projects include remodeling of offices for classrooms, replacement of outmoded equipment, asphaltic concrete paving at several schools, adding storage buildings to some campuses, improvement of lighting and acoustical facilities in older classrooms, and ground improvements.

"The harbor and south areas of our school system are among the fastest growing in the entire district. Passage of this bond issue will provide the school system with our minimum needs for the next several years," Superintendent Crowther stated.

In accordance with state laws, two separate propositions will be placed on the June 5 ballot. The elementary school portion of the bond program is part of the \$104,800,000 unified district program which will appear on the ballot as Proposition A. This includes all elementary, junior high, senior high school construction projects. Proposition B for junior colleges totals \$24,000,000.

A total of 1784 classrooms to house nearly 90,000 students will be built with the funds which Los Angeles School System voters are being asked to approve in Propositions A and B.

Two new schools will be constructed in this area. A site north of the present Bonita School will be located near the intersection of Perry and 197th St. Another future school will be constructed in the area north of the present Normont School in the vicinity of 242nd St. and President Ave.

"We have carefully weighed the value of every project in this proposal," stated Superintendent Crowther. "All projects which are in the program have met these criteria: absolute need for enrollment growth; conducting mandatory programs controlled by health, fire and safety codes.

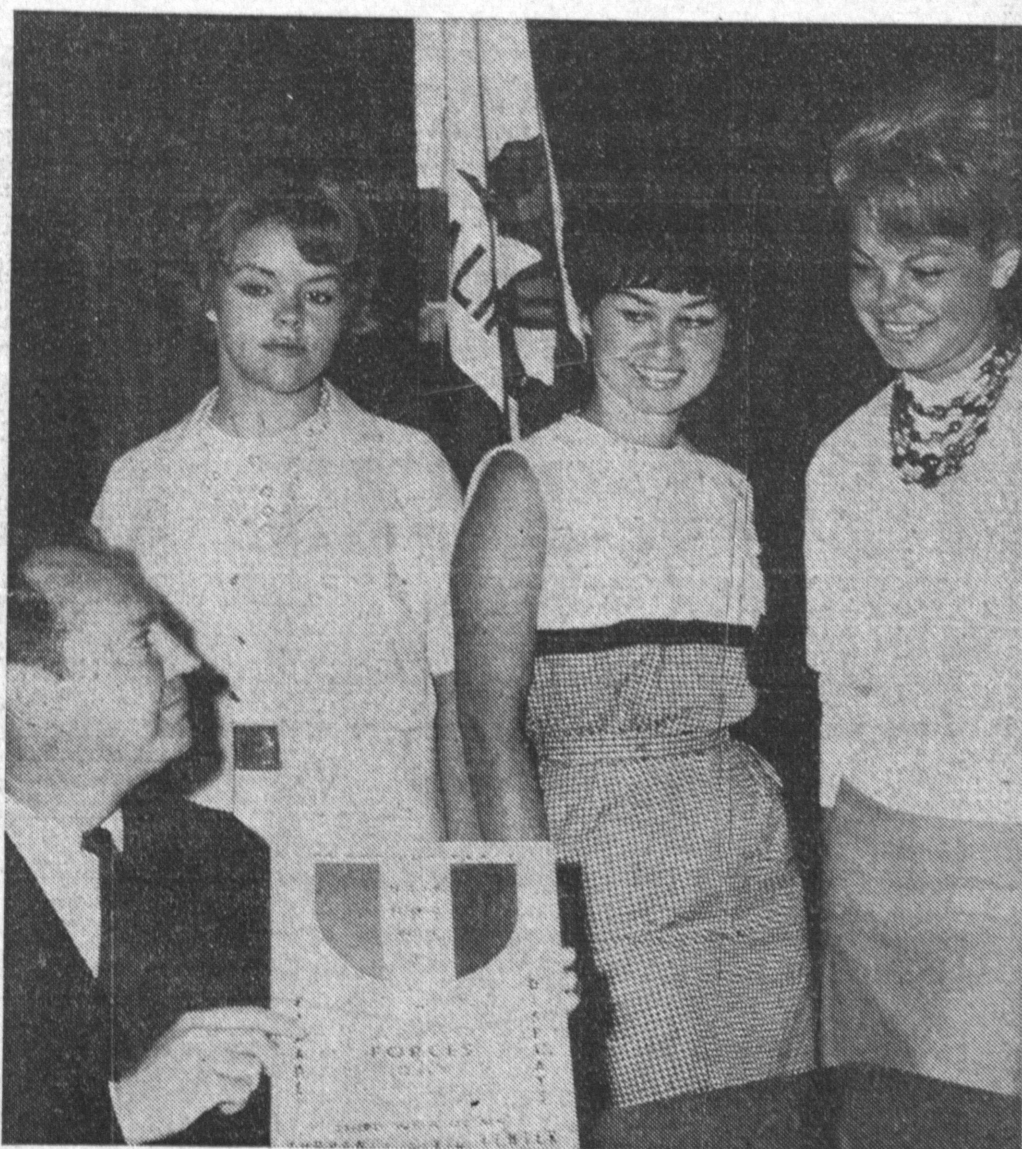
Torrance Cancer Drive Entering Home Stretch
