

# Warriors Drop Bid for Baseball Crown

## Stock Car Champ Battle Resumes Today at Western

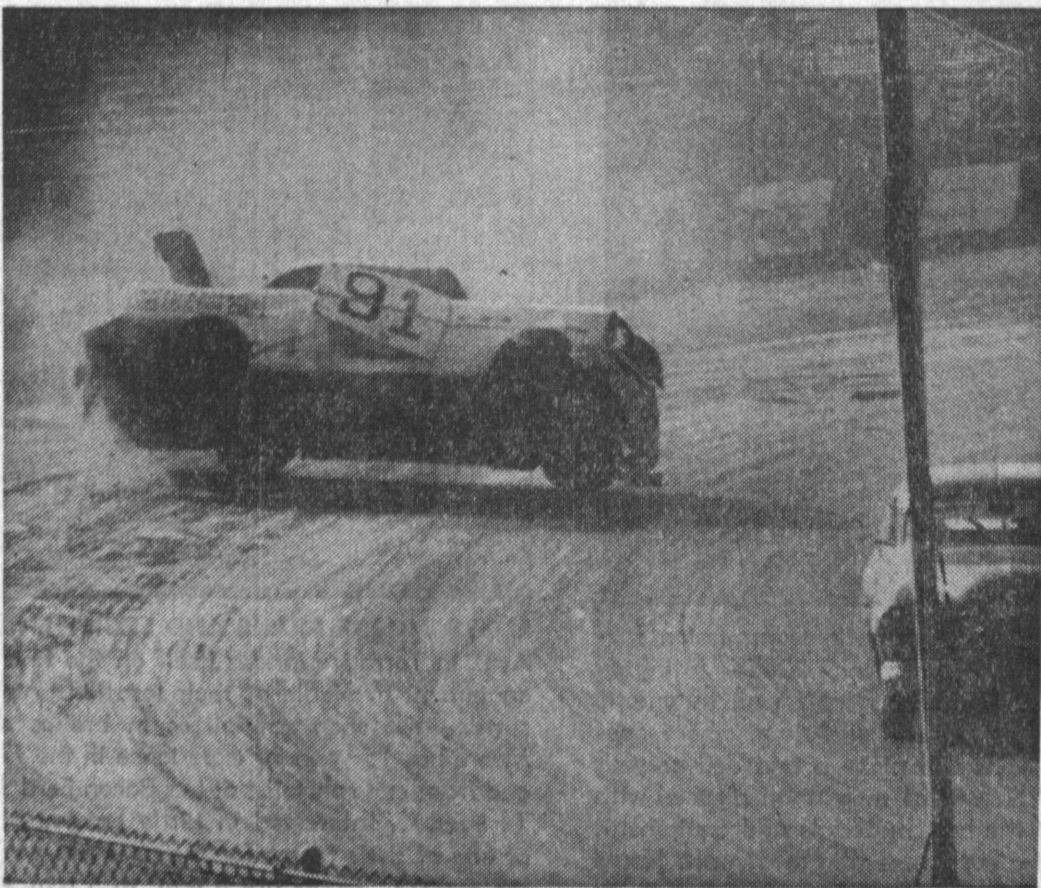
Marvin Heinis of Sylmar and Jim Cook of Norwalk will resume their battle for the 1962 CJA stock car racing championship this afternoon in the 30-lap main event at Gardena's Western Speedway, located at 199th St. and So. Western Ave.

Heinis leads Cook by sixty points going into today's nine event program. Heinis has 925 points to Cook's 865. Third in points is "Wild" Bill Foster of Newhall with 410 markers. Both Heinis and Foster will drive Oldsmobiles, while Cook will handle a Dodge.

Fourth in points is 1961 CJA stock car title holder, Arley Scranton of Compton, also in a Oldsmobile. He has 390 points, while fifth place driver Gene Davis of Venice has 370.

Heinis is a 48 year old construction worker, races on weekends, driving a maroon Oldsmobile. He is a grandfather, and has captured three main event wins this year.

The trials to select the days fastest sixteen cars for the thirty lap feature will begin at 1 p.m. First race of

## ECC Golf Stars Capture Twin Metro Championships

Clutch-playing El Camino College made history Monday, adding the Metropolitan Conference medal match crown to its circuit dual match championship at the Encino Country Club.

It was the first time in the college's history that the linksters have captured both Metro championships.

Under the guidance of Coach Al Greenleaf, the golfers averaged 74.8 strokes per man to edge favored Santa Monica by a bare two strokes.

With six men playing two 18-hole rounds, the Warriors wound up with an 898 total as Santa Monica (900), San Diego (926), Bakersfield (947) and Valley (980) trailed.

Coach Greenleaf praised his men for "shooting the best round of golf ever recorded at El Camino."

Victory marked a big improvement from last year's Warrior team which fourth in dual match play and fifth in medal competition—the worst a Greenleaf-coached team has finished at ECC.

## Valley Chops Warriors 3-2 in Tuesday Game

Ending a belated bid for the Metropolitan Conference baseball crown Tuesday, El Camino College's scrappy Indians blew the key game to the title, falling to Los Angeles Valley College, 3-2.

Although the margin of victory was razor thin for the Monarchs, it was the Tribe's biggest defeat of the year. With one chance in four to finish the season on top of the conference, the Braves were dropped from contention as a result of the Valley conflict in the Metro title race—the best the Braves can hope to finish now is in fourth place.

### BEAT LEADERS

El Camino gave the league a run for its money last week, downing the loop leaders, Long Beach and Bakersfield, in its drive for the top.

Warrior coach Chuck Freeman threw all he had at the invading Monarchs Tuesday in a game the Tribe four top hurlers saw action in the three-hour nerve-tangler, but clinch hitting fell by the wayside as the Tribe scattered eleven almost worthless hits.

Valley's Steve Ariga stated the Monarchs drive in the third inning as he drew a walk from Brave starter Lance Vlach. In a perfectly executed hit-and-run play, Ariga scored from first on a two-bag low by Chuck Abdox. Monarch Dennis Zeuner picked up Abdox, driving the ball through the Tribe infield.

Valley tacked on another run in the fifth, scoring the first run-off fireman Dick King.

Following an error on El Camino's John Ranslem, who dropped a foul pop, Ariga slapped a single to left. He scored on a safety by John Jones and an error on center fielder Frank Van Patten.

El Camino managed to get men on base, but continued its costly habit of leaving them stranded.

The Tribe left 14 men on base during the nine-inning contest. Frank Patten saw plenty of action on the sacks as he continued his torrid pace at the plate. Van Patten made his way to first four times via hits before someone noticed him and drove him home.

In the seventh, Van Patten scored on a single by Nick Fuscardo and an error Valley's Chuck Abdox.

El Camino made its last bid for victory in the home half of the ninth stanza.

Nick Fuscardo reached first on an error by Monarch first sacker Ron Shackelford. Bob Pier got the fans to their feet as he drove the ball 370 feet to center only to have Neal Stone flag it down. Bob Withers followed, driving Fuscardo home on a two-bag hit and John Torok ended the battle, with the tying run on third, drilling the ball to second baseman Abdox to cut off the Tribe threat. Reliever Dick King was tagged for the loss.
