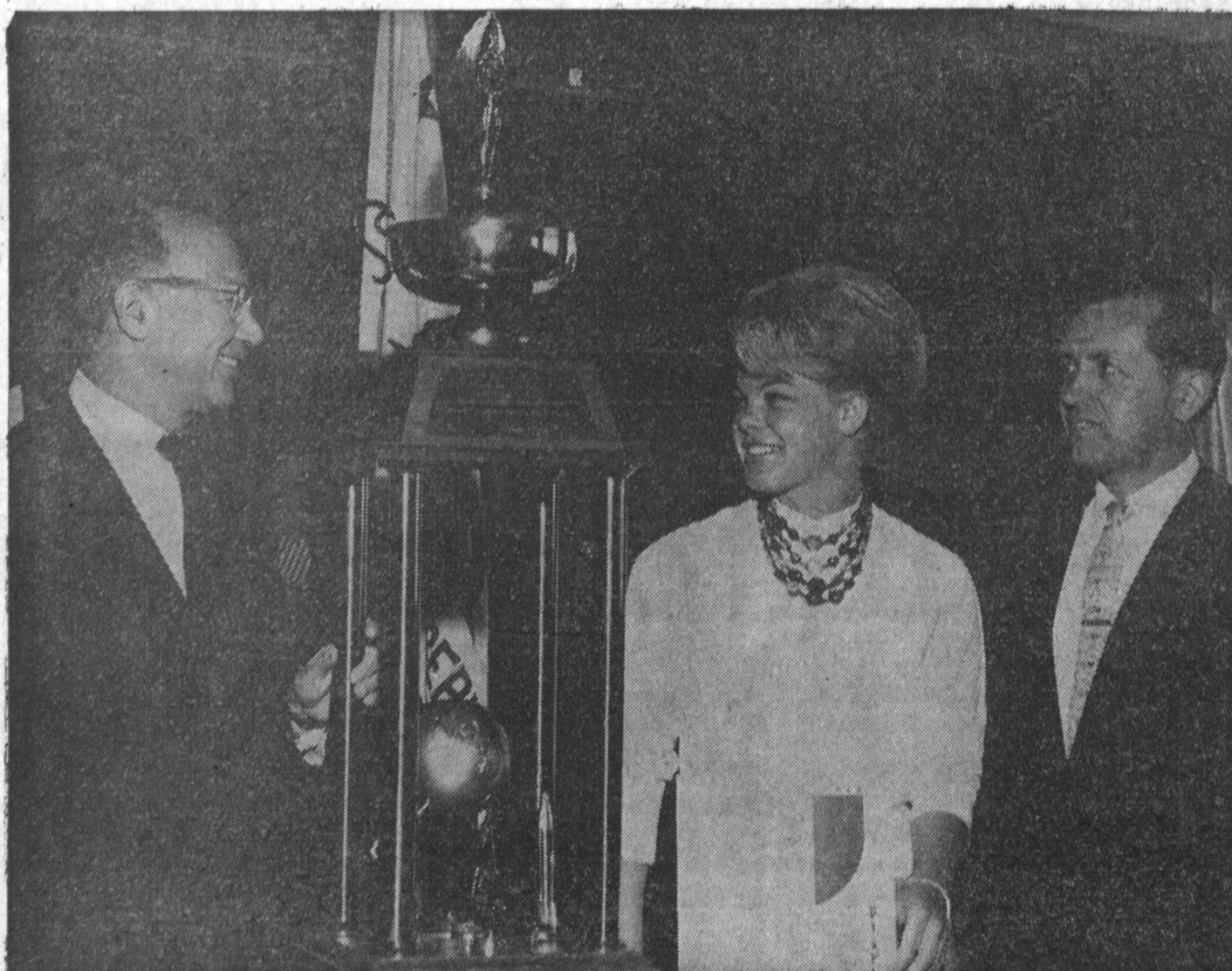


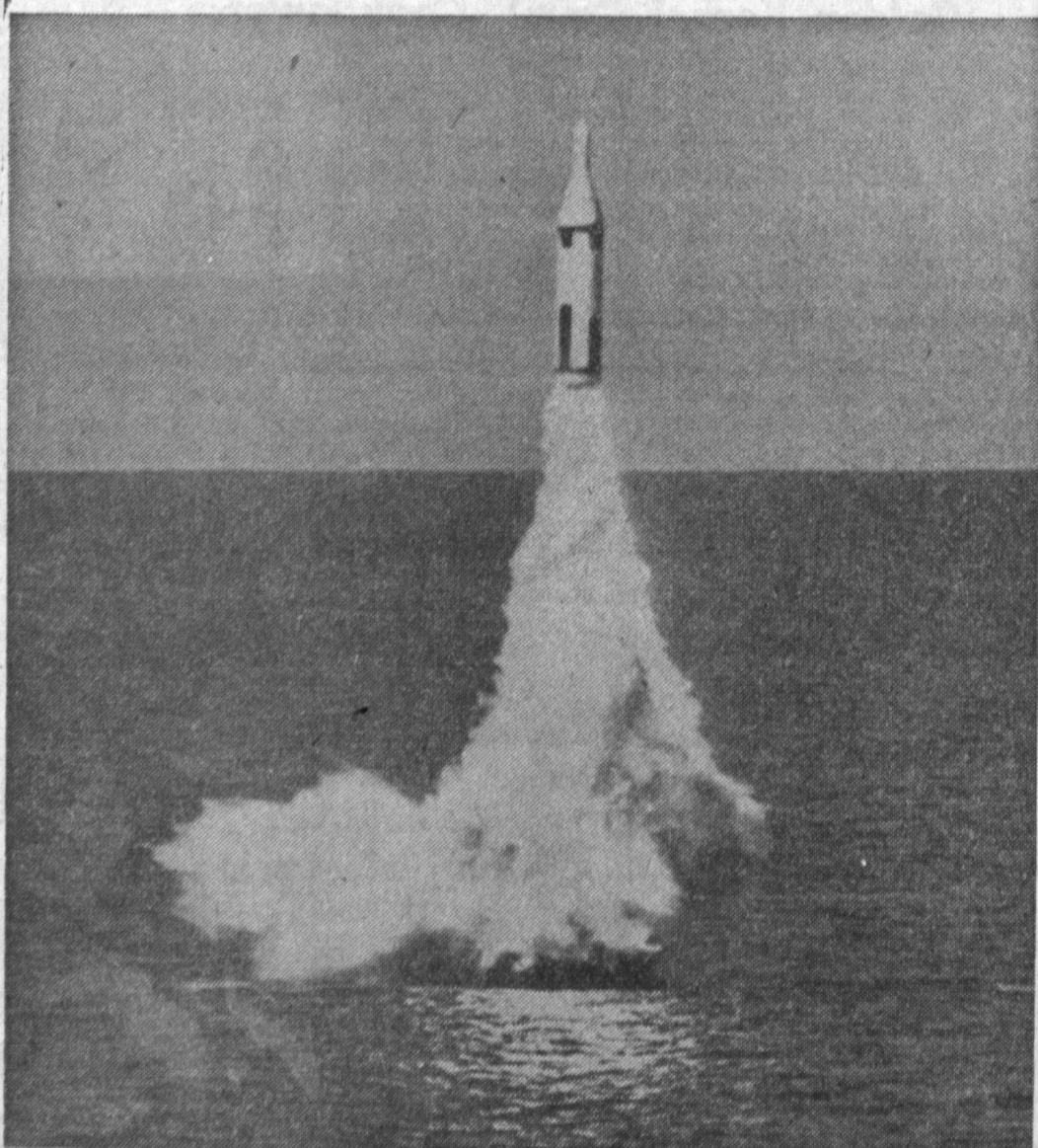
Picture Preview of Saturday Parade

and drill team from Manhattan Beach, Naval reserve units from Submarine Division 11-6 and destroyers Marsh, Vammen and Colahan of San Pedro and units of Surface Division 11-20 of Compton.

An added attraction in this year's parade is the appearance of the Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps from the University of California, Los Angeles, and the Naval Sea Cadet Corps of Compton.

Next in the line of march will be the Culver City High School band, two Civil Air Patrol units from San Pedro, the Torrance Civil Air Patrol squadron, the Original Dixieland Society of Roaring Teens Youth Band from the South Bay area, Loyal Order of Moose float, Torrance Youth Sports Council Little League float, Boy Scout Troop 996 and Cub Pack 966C under the sponsorship of the Torrance American Legion Post 170, and a color guard made up of Torrance legionnaires.

At the conclusion of the parade, Torrance Legionnaires will move from the parade route to the veterans monument in front of the Torrance city hall where they will place a memorial wreath.

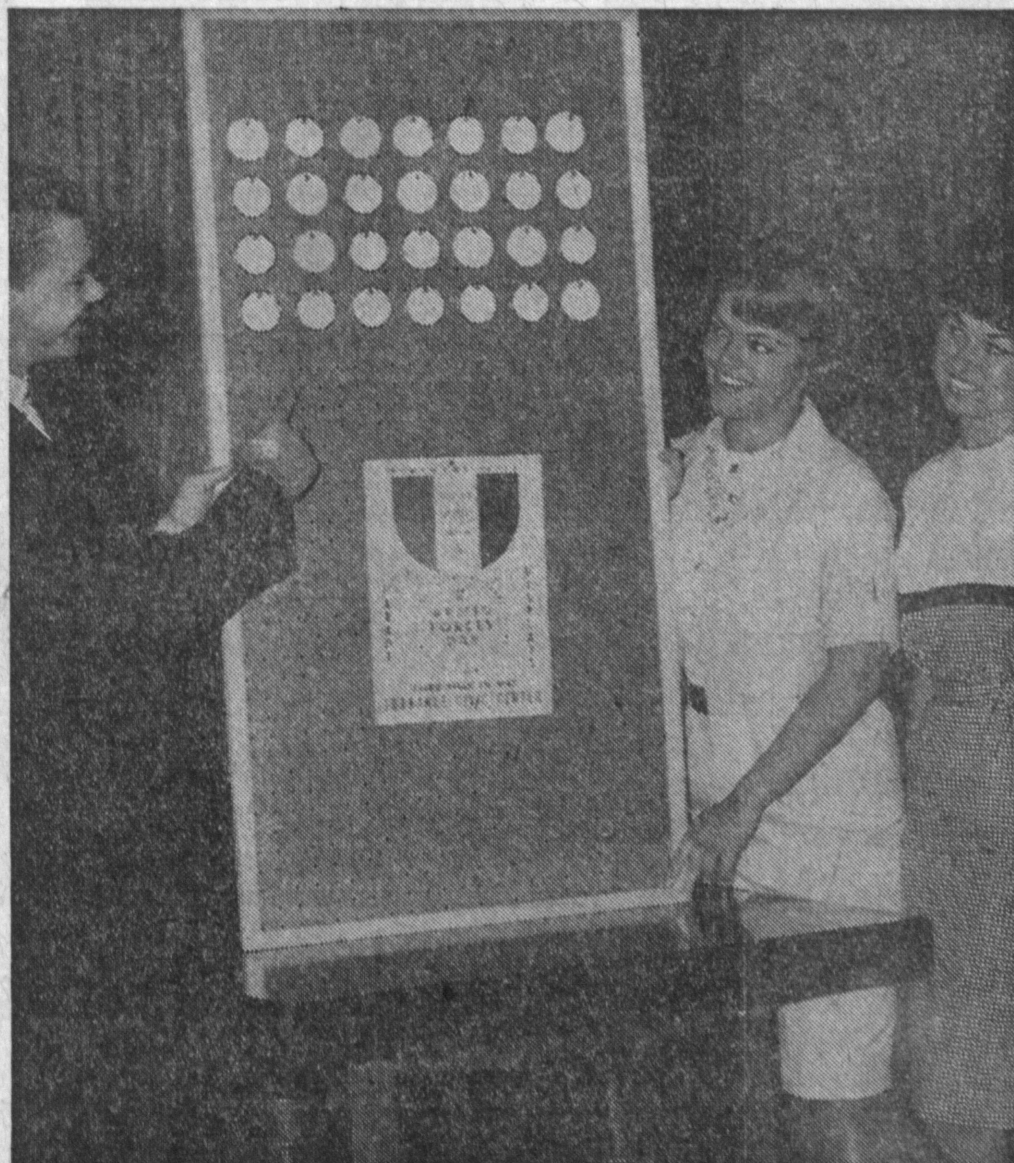
Following the parade the

official party will visit the military displays behind Torrance city hall. The display will be open to the public from 10:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.
