



Opponents Promise Battle' Before Issue Goes to Polls

A rousing battle on the Proponents of the plan adcontroversial issue of councilmanic districts is shaping up in the city of Torrance, as proponents of the plan prepare to circulate petitions.

Opposition is also starting to jell, it was reported yesterday. Opponents to the plan, who preferred to remain anonymous until their organization is formed, said that they would campaign against the issue before it reached the ballot.

Petitions would demand that the issue of councilmanic districts be placed on the November ballot.

A fifty-nine year old Tor-

mitted Friday that they had not determined the method of districting that should be followed.

John Crain, chairman of the petition committee. reported that he felt that districts should be drawn so that each area would include 10 percent or less of the population. This would invisage 10 councilmen, each representing one district.

Attorney John J. Barton, chairman of the boundary committee, reported that one of the issues to be settled would be to determine if population or area

districts would be most efficient.

Opponents to the plan felt that council distributing would tend to perpetuate councilmen in office. would make councilmen more receptive to the wishes of their own districts than the good of the entire city, and "would bring on the day of the "ward-heeler" in Tor-

"In addition," they said, "the individual citizen would be allowed to vote for only one of the six councilmen who, in theory, would be repre-senting him."
