Water Co. Asks Rate Increase

The State Public Utilities Commission reported today that California Water Service Company has requested authority to raise rates in its Hermosa Beach-Redondo Beach district by six-tenths of a cent per 100 cubic feet of water.

The total amount sought by the company is \$27,200 as an offset to cover a higher pumping tax imposed by the Central and West Basin Water Replenishment District.

The company serves approximately 21,000 customers in Hermosa Beach, Redondo Beach, a small portion of Torrance, and adjacent unincorporated territory.

Responsibility of Gov't Noted by Demo Candidate

A new concept in federal responsibility for area employment was developed by Attorney Robert J. Felixson last week at a rally of Torrance and South Bay Democrats at the Waltheria Park Building, Torrance.

Felixson, Democratic candidate for Congress in the 28th District, stated: "The economy of this area has been geared to defense industry for the last 20 years because the federal government needed our production. 'I believe the government now has a moral obligation to see to it that this area is allocated the contracts necessary to furnish employment to the workers who moved here specifically because their services were needed.'"


Felixson, criticizing the argument that defense contracts should be assigned to areas of high unemployment, pointed out that this served no useful purpose, if, in awarding a contract one place to ease unemployment, it caused hardship and unemployment in another area.

As for the argument that contracts should be awarded only on a basis of efficiency and economy, Felixson agreed that these criteria must certainly be considered by the government, but that it would not be just or right, at this point, to build up defense industries in other parts of the country just because labor or other costs were slightly cheaper there.

"The defense industries were concentrated in our area for good reason, and, in effect, at the behest of the federal government.

"The government must, I believe, assume its share of responsibility for the economic health of the area,"

Civic Leader Will Head Frederick Kepka Campaign

Boris Woolley, 2271 Torrance Blvd., prominent Torrance attorney and civic leader, has been named area chairman for the Superior Court judge campaign of Frederick A. Kepka.

Superior Court Commissioner Frederick Kepka of Los Angeles County is a candidate for judge of the Superior Court, Office No. 47, on the June 5 ballot. Fourteen other persons are seeking this office; however, Kepka already has had substantial and successful experience on the bench and is eminently qualified for the position.

In addition to acting as a judge pro tem in the trial of contested Superior Court actions, Kepka determines ex parte motions in civil and probate proceedings. More than 10,000 cases have been adjudicated by him with only three having been appealed and these were unanimously affirmed by the District Court of Appeals.

Kepka, 44 years old, was born in Albany, Ore., received A.B. and L.L.B. degrees from the University of Michigan, attended Harvard University School of Business Administration preparatory to being commissioned a supply and accounting officer in the U. S. Navy.

He actively served the Navy in that capacity and as legal advisory officer during World War II, attained the rank of lieutenant com-

mander. Following his release in 1945, he was employed by the firm of Hill, Morgan & Farrer of Los Angeles.

In 1946 he was recalled to active duty with the Navy and received an honorary retirement in 1949. He then opened his own law office, where he engaged in private practice until his appointment to the Superior Court office he now holds.
