Warrior Golfers Favored For State Championships

Bidding for their third major conquest of the year, El Camino College golfers journeyed to Bakersfield Monday for the State tournament.

Already boasting the Metropolitan Conference dual match and medal play championships, the Tribe expected to encounter trouble from the northern colleges plus stiff opposition from Menlo, Pasadena, Santa Ana and Santa Monica.

Santa Monica definitely posed a problem. The Corsairs finished only two strokes behind the Warriors in the Metro medal play tourney.

El Camino won the conference title with each of its six men averaging 74.8

strokes for an 898 total. Samo finished the tournament with a 900 total and may have an edge over ECC in Bakersfield since the Tribe offers a better six-man team than the four-man squad which competed in the State match.

Steve Hallberg, Dennis Drury, Dan Titus and Dave Scott will carry the Brave fortunes up north. Larry Sprengel will also represent El Camino, but only in the battle for the individual crown.

Play began Monday morning and each man shot 36 holes with the championship going to the team with the low aggregate score. Sprengel and Hallberg tied for team low-medalist honors in the Metro tourney over 36 holes on the Encino Country Club course.

The two Warriors carded 147s, with Drury turning in a 148, Titus a 152, and Scott a 154.

Rolling Hills' unique husband-and-wife horseman team of Duane and Eleta White today loomed as top favorites for tonight's fourth Ascot Horse Show and Races under the arc lights. Gates open at 6:30 p.m., with the grand entry set for 8 p.m. Admission is free of charge.

With competition open to all Southland horse owners, who may show their animals or enter them in the unrestricted competition in which girl riders may compete with men on equal terms, eight varied races and events will be held, including quarter-mile, half-mile and mile flat races, plus pole bending, barrel racing, Indian "Apaloosa" races, boot races and "Rescue Racing."


Camp Clatawa in the mountains, dog obedience class for children, and Housewives' Bowling league.


