The project was designed by the Bridge Division of the Los Angeles County Road / Department, and is being financed jointly by the Road Department and the County Flood Control Dis-trict in conjunction with the District's Dominguez Channel enprovement program. The Eridge structure is éxpected to be completed in April, 1963.

Major construction part of this multiphase project will consist of building a reinforced concrete deck bridge incorporating steel girders with 84-foot wide roadways and two sidewalks on both Wilmington Ave. and 223rd St. In addition, a portion of Dominguez Channel in the vicinity of the project will be constructed.

Another phase of the work will consist of the construction of pavement, curb and gutten, drainage facilities,
