Press Endorses Assembly Candidate Nick Drale

Torrance, for the first time in its history, has the opportunity to be represented fully in ", state assem-

Although this city is the largest in entire southwestern part of the county, not one of the three assemblymen whose districts impinge within our boundaries resides in Torrance.

Nickolas O. Drale, a Torrance city councilman, has thrown his hat into the ring and will seek the Democratic nomination in the primaries next Tuesday.

He will seek to upset the incumbent Assemblyman in the state primary elections and then go on to defeat a Republican rival for the post in November-
