TORRANCE MAN DEAD IN BURGLARY ATTEMPT

Owner Kills Youth

A Torrance man, allegedly caught while trying to burglarize a Gardena area bar, was shot and killed early this week.

Jack A. Hanna, 21, of 20712 Berendo Ave., was pronounced dead by physicians called to the scene.

Richard Munz, 36, owner of Rich's Sports Club, 19606 Normandie, told investigating officers that he had been burglarized several times within recent months and had decided to "stake out" the bar.

At approximately 3 a.m. Monday, he said, he heard someone pry open the front door of the club and enter.

When he called for the suspect to halt, he said, the figure apparently raised some object and pointed it at him. Munz said he fired three shots, the suspect tried to run, and then fell.

Munz said that he then called deputies, from the Firestone Sheriff's Office.

Hanna had been struck once in the back.
