Navy Offers Opportunity To HS Grads

High school seniors who wish to apply for specialized Navy training may qualify now and delay enlistment until after their graduation in June under a new plan announced by Chief Roth, Recruiter in charge of the Torrance recruiting station.

Under this procedure of the Navy's "Stay in School" policy, the applicant for a school of his choice may avoid the red tape by disposing of preliminary testing now and qualifying with a high school diploma just before enlistment.

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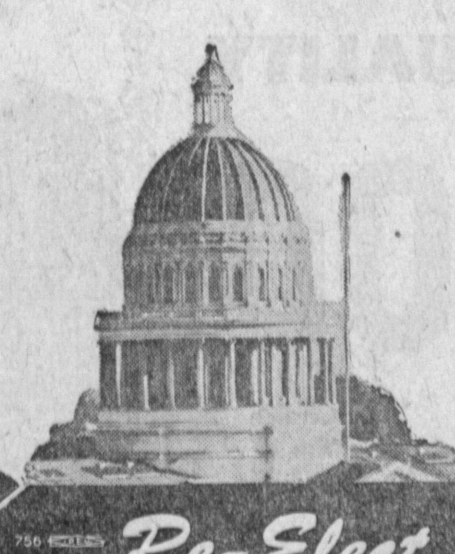
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
