

## Pre-Processing Offered by AF To HS Grads

A new policy for enlistment procedures in the U.S. Air Force was announced today by SSgt. Cecil C. Mayberry, Torrance Air Force Recruiter. The U.S. Air Force Recruiting Service headquarters in southern California, has authorized pre-processing of high school seniors for enlistment.

Sergeant Mayberry, said that the pre-processing includes the Air Force qualifying examination; an interview; physical examination and the armed forces qualification test. The high school senior, after successfully qualifying in all processing procedures, will definitely know the specific area that he will be enlisted in and more important, the Air Force career grouping that he will be eligible to train in, during his technical training period. The senior will be completely processed for enlistment and upon graduation from high school, the oath of enlistment in the Air Force and subsequent travel to Lackland Air Force Base in historic San Antonio, Texas may immediately be effected.

One of the popular aspects of pre-processing, is that "Buddy Groups" can be formed and friends are guaranteed that they will enlist, travel and receive basic training together as an integral group.

## Summer Field Training for National Guardsmen Scheduled

Annual summer field training dates for National Guardsmen of this area today were announced by Major Charles A. Ott, Jr., Commanding General, 40th Armored Division.

Components of the Southern California "Grizzly" division will train at both Fort Irwin, near Barstow, and at Camp Roberts and Hunter Liggett Military Reservation near Paso Robles.

Members of Combat Command C will train at Fort Irwin from July 21 to August 4 under the direction of Colonel Maurice Chandler, 13752 Cohasset Avenue, Van Nuys. Combat Command C is headquartered in Pasadena.

Combat Command A, led by Colonel Thomas O. Lawson, will undergo two weeks of rigorous training from August 11 to 25 at Fort Irwin. Lawson resides at 7720 Henefer Ave., Los Angeles.

The remainder of the more than 8,000-man 40th will train at Camp Roberts and Hunter Liggett, August 4 through 18 under the command of Major General Ott of Santa Barbara.

General Ott will be assisted

by Brigadier General Glenn C. Ames, division artillery commander, of 9457 Louise Ave., Northridge; Brigadier-General Edward F. Niblock, assistant division commander, of 2995 Ceylon Drive, Costa Mesa; Colonel Donald M. Moore, commander of Combat Command B, of 6318 W. 78th St., Los Angeles; and Colonel Robert A. Long, commander of Division Trains, of 4103 N. La Rica Avenue, Baldwin Park.

Camp Roberts — famed World War II and Korean Conflict training base — is well suited for small arms firing squad and platoon maneuvers and the firing of weapons as large as the eight inch Howitzer.

Fort Irwin, located south of Death Valley National Monument in the Mojave Desert, is one of the world's foremost tank training centers.

Primary aim of the 40th Division training this year will be increased proficiency in platoon and unit level tactical assignments, according to Major General Ott.

Units will spend a minimum of four consecutive days and nights in tactical
