Pool Safety Pointers Offered by Red Cross

This school term may be nearly over, but "school's never out on safety around the home," the American Red Cross said today.

"This is particularly true if you have a home swimming pool," said Walter West, volunteer chairman of the Safety Services committee of Torrance-Lomita Branch, American National Red Cross.

"The private swimming pool adds healthy physical fun to a family's summer recreation, but it is also a great responsibility," West said. He offered the following points on which the householder can test himself as owner of a safe home swimming pool:

1. Is the pool fenced in, with an adequate padlock on the gate? This is desirable in all instances; essential if small children have access to the pool.

2. What is the paving material surrounding the pool? It should be as slipproof as possible.

3. Are the shallow and deep sections of the pool clearly separated by a buoyed line? This is necessary if it is used by weak swimmers and non-swimmers.

4. Do you enforce the rule that no one should swim alone? One should always swim with a companion.

5. Is there supervision for small children at all times? This is a safety "must."

6. Do you discourage running and horseplay around the pool? Boisterous behavior can lead to painful accidents and sometimes tragedy.

7. Do all users of your pool know or are learning how to swim? The local Red Cross chapter can help solve this problem with its free swimming course.

8. If the water in your

pool is deep enough for diving, is the diving board properly placed for the greatest safety?

9. Do you enforce the rule of "no swimming under the diving board?" Collisions of human bodies in the water can be painful.

10. Do you keep all swimmers out of the pool during storms? Water is a conductor of lightning.

11. Is there some provision for shade so pool users can get respite from the sun? Beach umbrellas will do the trick.

12. Are swimmers kept out of the water at least an hour after eating? Swimming too soon after a meal may lead to cramps.

13. Do you discourage swimming soon after drinking? Excessive drinking followed by swimming may result in a fatality.

14. Do you keep the pool area clear of glassware? Broken glasses and bottles are accident hazards.

15. Do you have rescue devices, such as reaching poles or ring buoys close at hand? They may be essential in saving a swimmer in trouble.

16. Do you keep a first aid kit near the pool? It may come in handy, too.

17. Can at least one member of your family administer artificial respiration? It could mean the difference between life and death for someone.

If you can answer most of these questions in the affirmative, yours is a safe pool, Mr. West said.

He gave one final recommendation: Make sure the pool conforms to good sanitary practice and the regulations for this purpose established by the local health department.

Enlistees Accepted Now in Coast Guard

Young men who can qualify may now enlist in the U.S. Coast Guard without having to be placed on a waiting list. Senior Chief Radioman H. T. Collins, Officer in charge, GG recruiting station Long Beach, said today.

"Prior to this time applicants have had an average three months wait before their enlistment could be effected," Collins said.

Enlistees undergo their basic training at Coast Guard Base, Alameda, Calif., and are then assigned to one of the Coast Guard ships or stations throughout the world. New coastguardsmen who can qualify may be assigned to one of the many advanced training schools available.

Openings are also immediately available for the enlistment of former Coast

Guard and Navy Petty Officers who were radiomen, sonar-men, electronics technicians, quartermasters or fire control technicians. "These men will be enlisted in their former pay grade, and will be immediately assigned to either a ship or station. Ex-chief Petty Officers in these ratings will be enlisted as first class petty officers," he said.

In addition to the regular four-year enlistment open to former petty officers, the Coast Guard offers an inactive reserve enlistment for Petty Officers of any rate. These men or women may be enlisted in the Coast Guard Reserve in their old pay grade or higher, depending upon their civilian qualifications.
