Huge heraldic shields, emblazoned with the Lasuen crest bearing the cross and bell device will rise above classic white urns filled with cardinal flowers and gold leaves, at either side of the long buffet table. Vigil candles flickering through ruby glass will light the scene.

A luncheon was served at 3 p.m. Dancing to Joe Radulovich's combo was enjoyed from 5 to 7 p.m.

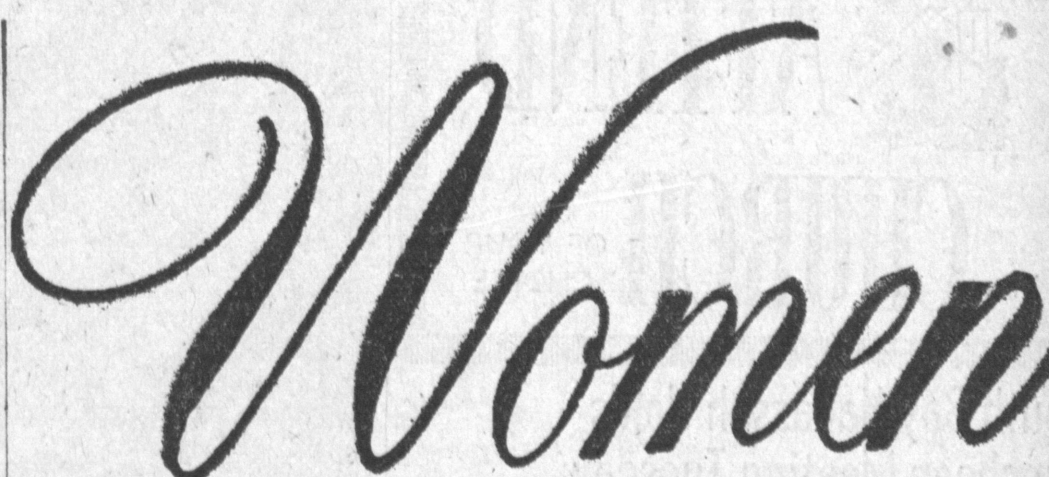
