Darryl Hickman, of television and movie fame, was guest speaker several weeks ago during a club meeting and was the promoter of these projects. Hickman awakened the compassion of all who heard him tell about a small community in Bogota, Columbia.

A priest, Fr. Rafael Garcia Herreros, has spent the

last 10 years of his life trying to rebuild the lives of the very needy by helping them to build a community where they may be self supporting. Since 1956 he has built two factories, 300 homes (for over 2000 people) a school, and a cooperative grocery store. He wants only the necessities for his people, a sense of dignity and a chance to work and to better themselves.

Hickman firmly believes Fr. Herreros has the answer to much of the world's prob-

lems in fighting Communism, and so inspired the members of the Mother's Club that in just a few short weeks they raised the \$625 needed to house one family.

The check was presented to Hickman by Mrs. James Carlin, president of the Nativity Mother's Club, at a recent meeting to the Nativity Chi-Rho Club.

Chi-Rho Club under the direction of Mr. Robert Sludger, is planning in some way to start another fund to build a home for another needy family in Bogota.
