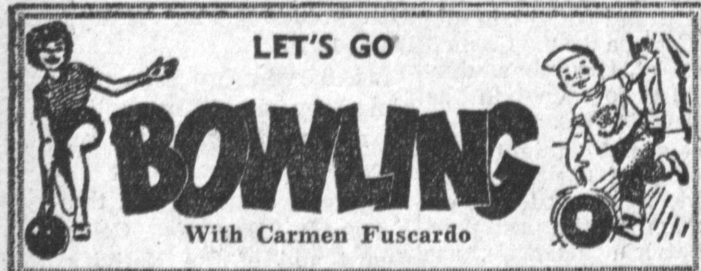

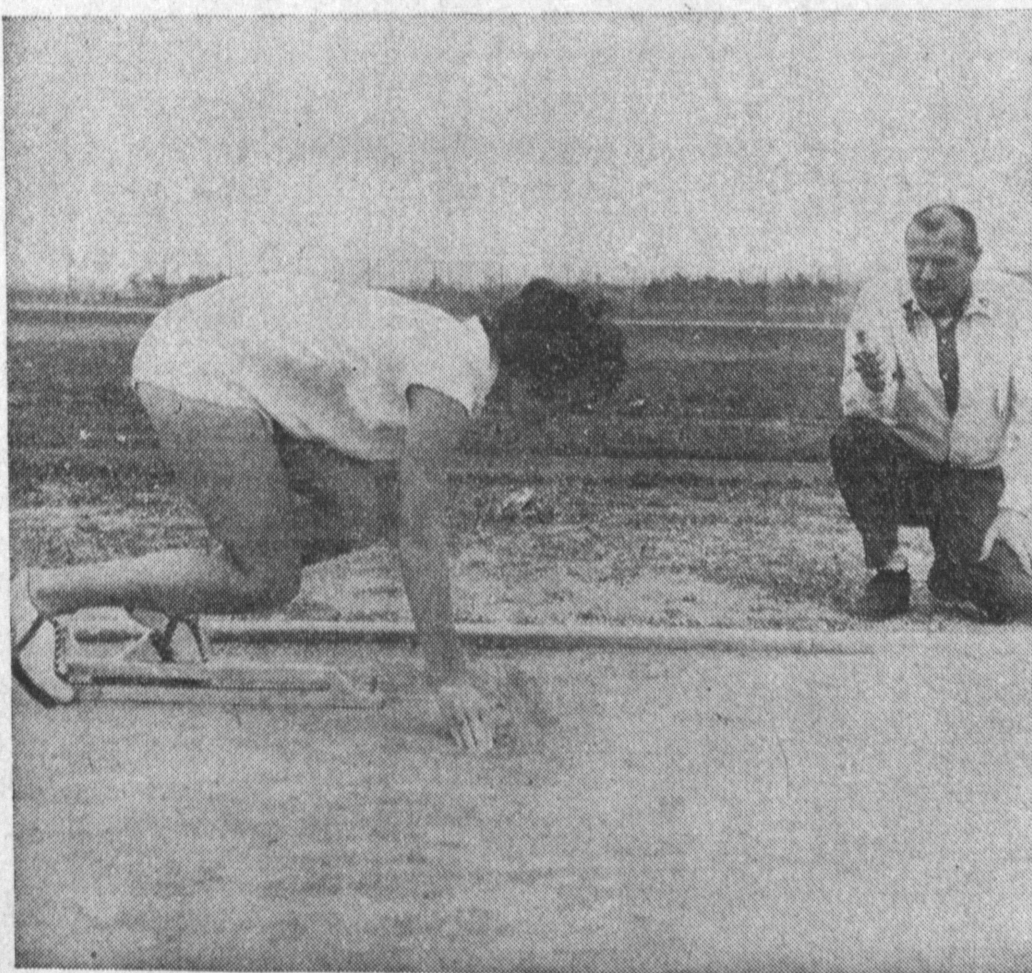
Day Camp For Blind Children

A six-week summer day camp for blind children will be held at Recreation Park, 7th and Park Ave., Long Beach, beginning July 11, it was announced today by the Braille Institute.

Enrollment is open without charge to blind children ages 8 to 12 living in the Greater Long Beach area, Lakewood-Bellflower, Torrance-Redondo, the Palos Verdes peninsula and adjacent areas.

Camp activities will be conducted twice a week, Wednesdays and Fridays, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. The program will include swimming, crafts, games, contests, nature study and novelty entertainment. Three cookouts are scheduled for the period, ending Aug. 17.

While the camp will be directed by experienced staff members of the Braille Institute, a spokesman stated that volunteer drivers and junior counselors from the Greater Long Beach area are urgently needed.

South High Coed Wins Top Position in Recent A.A.U. Women's Meets

Pam Arndt, a pert 15-year-old Hollywood Riviera girl, is one of the finest young athletic prospects in the Torrance area.

With her sights set on making the 1968 United States women's track team for the Olympic games, she is gaining experience and training via local, district, and regional, AAU women's meets in Southern California.

A South High School freshman, she gave a tremendous showing this past weekend at the AAU District Women's championships at Mt. San Antonio

College. Competing in the 14 to 17 age group, she placed second in the 220 (27.9) and third in the running broad jump with a leap of 16' 1 1/2".

Although her 220 time was 0.6 seconds off her best time, it still was good enough to qualify her for this Saturday's regional meet in Bakersfield, where she'll also double in the broad jump.

The youngster is a natural runner destined for great heights. Considering her inexperience her feats this season are phenomenal. She just began her career this spring under the persuasion of South High track coach Dick Scully, who noticed her during a Girls' Athletic Association track meet against North High recently.

Now that the regular season is completed, she is being coached by her father, Don Arndt, of 348 Paseo de Gracia, who finds the time to add his support and advice.

She plans to work out during the summer with a long distance look towards the 1968 Olympic Games. She's off to a good start.

Besides her athletic ability, the girl also has leadership qualities and was recently elected president of next year's sophomore class by her classmates.

BEST START
