Legion Fireworks Show July 4

Los Angeles Mayor Sam W. Yorty yesterday issued a proclamation in tribute to the 30th annual fireworks spectacular of the Los Angeles County Council of the American Legion with its theme "A Salute to America." The event is to be held in the coliseum on the evening of July 4.

The official document of the city's chief executive hailed the festivity, which provides enjoyment for nearly 80,000 persons gathering in the famed stadium for the patriotic holiday.

The proclamation also pointed out the event is for a worthy cause in that the proceeds go to underwrite the programs of American Legion charities, which includes veterans' rehabilitation.

The show will feature giant fireworks, boys baseball game, grand entry parade and a three-ring circus. Tickets are on sale at all Thrifty Drug Stores, mutual agencies, Southern California Music Company and the Legion offices in Patriotic Hall (RI 7-5341).

Special Space Flight Equipment From Northrop

"Q-Ball" — the spherical "hot nose" air data sensor developed by Northrop Corporation's Northrop Division for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration X-15 rocket plane — is being specially adapted for the Saturn C-1 booster, according to Frederick Stevens, vice president and divisional general manager.

Sensor will be used on Saturn initially for high altitude wind investigations. Subsequent Saturn shots will carry a Q-Ball to supply instrumentation outputs for telemetry and possibly for ascent control of the vehicle. The Saturn space booster is being developed at the George C. Marshall Space Flight Center, Huntsville, Alabama.

Work is being performed at the Northrop's Electronic Systems and Equipment Department, Hawthorne, California, under contract to NASA. Latest contract for

the Q-Ball sensor packages amounts to \$234,000. Previous contracts with NASA provided a large measure of the research necessary to adapt Q-Ball to the Saturn mission.

Q-Ball's Saturn configuration will include fixed sensing ports which from the electronic equipment to external positions on the nose cone. On the X-15, Q-Ball, sensing air data through orifices in a movable sphere which is servomechanized to face the relative wind at all times, measures angles of attack and sideslip to warn the pilot of frictional heat build-up.

Open to any interested member of the community who enjoys work in choral music, the Community Choir offers enrichment and training in class and concert singing, the instructor noted.

"We have planned work to include music from Brahms, Bruckner, Loesser and folk songs so that we cover a range of musical interests," Mikkelsen explained.

The class meets Monday and Wednesday from 7:30 to 10 p.m. during the six-week summer session of June 20 to August 1.

Tentative date of the summer concert program is Aug. 13.

Torrance Couple To Attend Denver Conventinon

Mr. and Mrs. W. Howard Smith, Torrance, will leave next week to attend the 29th national convention of Modern Woodmen of America, which meets June 25 to 27 in Denver, Colo. Smith is one of six delegates chosen to represent California as a national delegate. He was elected to this post at the state convention in San Jose on May 2.

In Denver he will meet with more than 200 national officers, delegates and committee men, representing the fraternal society's membership in the United States and Canada. The national convention is the governing body of the 79-year-old organization, and while in session will elect officers and outline policies for the ensuing four-year term.

USSR VISIT

A delegation of Soviet diamond craftsmen is to visit Israel to study diamond-cutting methods there, it is announced by the Israel Office of Information in New York. The delegation, the first such mission from the Soviet Union to visit Israel, is expected to remain in the country for several weeks.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Do You Operate Under a Fictitious Firm Name?

1. **Ques.** What is a Fictitious Firm Name?

Ans. Any name which does not completely and clearly identify the owner or owners.

2. **Ques.** Why should an individual or partnership doing business under a Fictitious Name file and publish a Certificate?

Ans. 1. The law is specific and mandatory. Business people, like other persons, should obey the law. 2. No Court action of any sort can be maintained until Certificate is filed and published. Such filing and publishing contributes to the value and protection of a trade name.

3. **Ques.** Is the name "J. B. Smith Company" a fictitious name?

Ans. Yes. Because the term "company" is ambiguous and suggestive of uncertainty.

4. **Ques.** How can customer find out if he has filed and published his certificate of business?

Ans. Simply by checking with the Corporation department of your county clerk's office, or by telephoning Los Angeles Newspaper Service Bureau, Inc., MA 5-2541.

5. **Ques.** What does Section 2468 of the Civil Code mean by the wording that no person or partnership failing to comply "shall maintain any action upon, or on account of, any contract or contracts made or transaction had," under such fictitious name in any Court of this State?

Ans. Simply that the person or partnership cannot sue.

6. **Ques.** Does that mean that cash stores are not affected?

Ans. There are many grounds for court action besides the mere collection of past due accounts. For instance, a cash grocery may wish to sue a trucking company for damage to shipments.

7. **Ques.** In case one partner is succeeded by another, must a new certificate be filed and published?

Ans. Yes. "Every person transacting business in this state under a fictitious name" must file and publish.

8. **Ques.** In case one partner is succeeded by another, must a new certificate be filed and published?

Ans. Yes. Section 2469 of the Civil Code states that "On every change in the members of a partnership transacting business

in this State under a fictitious name . . . a new certificate must be filed with the County Clerk and a new publication made."

9. **Ques.** Must a corporation file and publish a certificate?

Ans. Yes, when the corporation as a person owns and operates some other business under a fictitious firm name. In such event it must file and publish, otherwise not.

10. **Ques.** Do public authorities demand compliance with the fictitious firm law?

Ans. Yes. For instance, the California State Department of Vocational Standards will not issue a license to any contractor or contracting partnership who has not filed and published.

11. **Ques.** May a person or person engaged in more than one business under fictitious name meet the publication requirements by filing and printing only one certificate?

Ans. The Los Angeles County Counsel has ruled: "We incline to opinion that the provisions of said section contemplate a certificate be filed and published for EACH fictitious name under which a business is transacted."

12. **Ques.** Does the filing and publication of a Trade Name Certificate have value in establishing owner's title in a firm name?

Ans. Yes, the courts have held such registration and publication to be a prima facie evidence of name ownership where two claimants to a name have contested ownership.

13. **Ques.** How may a Certificate be prepared, filed and published?

Ans. See your lawyer, bank, Torrance Press or the County Clerk.

14. **Ques.** What will it cost?

Ans. The statutory two dollar County Clerk fee for filing, plus the publisher's rate of \$15 for four weekly insertions of the advertisement, amounting to a total of \$17.

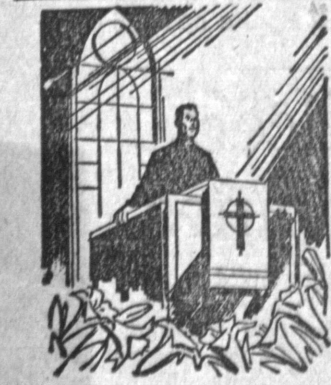
15. **Ques.** Where may filing service be obtained?

Ans. Complete service, forms and printed instructions is given FREE by the Torrance Press.
