

LA City School Building Plans Halted by Proposition Failure

Classroom building projects totaling approximately \$50,000,000—all the remaining portion of the 1960 school bond issue scheduled to have been spent by the end of the year—have been ordered temporarily halted by Superintendent of Schools Jack P. Crowther.

The action was taken, Crowther said, as a result of the failure of Propositions A and B at last Tuesday's primary election. The \$128,800,000 bond issue proposed in the two propositions would have continued, without interruption, a classroom building program which now totals \$2,000,000 weekly. The funds would have provided more than 170 classrooms to take care of an enrollment increase of 105,000 students in the next three years.

"It is evident that failure of Propositions A and B will mean major increases in half day sessions in many areas, some—such as the central area—already critically over-crowded," Superintendent Crowther emphasized.

As a result of the Superintendent's action, June 7, the City Board of Education immediately ordered the cancelling of \$1,700,000 in construction contracts sched-

uled to be awarded at Thursday's Board meeting.

Affected by the board's order were the following local projects:

Andrew Carnegie Junior High School site, Carson St. and Bonita St. in the Carson area, \$264,980, preliminary grading and site improvements. This school was originally scheduled to be built at a cost of approximately \$3,000,000—with funds from the 1960 bond issue.

Fifty-seven portable classrooms, \$518,126, including the following local elementary schools: Fries Avenue, 1301 Fries Ave., Wilmington, 2, \$17,000; 223rd Street, 1123 W. 223rd St., 2, \$17,000; and Del Amo, 1825 E. 213th St., Torrance, 2, \$17,000.

Forty-two portable classrooms, \$357,750, at 13 elementary schools.

Alterations and improvements, \$149,425, including the following local high school, Banning, 1500 Avalon Blvd., Wilmington, \$28,705.

Science classroom alterations, \$23,000 at junior high schools.

A two-unit kindergarten classroom building, at \$45,000 for each building, at Van Deene Avenue, 826 W. Javelin St., Torrance.

10 Art Classes Are Scheduled For Summer Session at Harbor

Ten classes in various phase of art will be offered by Harbor College during both day and evening hours of the six week summer session from July 9 to Aug. 17, Dean of Summer Session Robert V. Bacon said this week.

Classes will be offered in beginning and intermediate drawing and painting, perspective drawing, lettering and crafts.

Miss Jari Havlena and William Burchfield will instruct the summer classes. Burchfield, an artist and architect will give special emphasis to drawing techniques, both beginning and advanced techniques in water color painting, and instruction in lettering. These classes are scheduled in the morning and afternoon.

Miss Havlena, a well-known painter will offer in-

struction in drawing and composition. Students will be given an opportunity to work in mixed media as well as water color. Miss Havlena welcomes experienced students desiring to do experimental painting projects.

Registration for all summer session students will take place from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. and from 6 to 8 p.m., July 5 and 6. No individual appointments are necessary.

All courses carry regular college credit. Classes are scheduled for morning, afternoon and evening sessions. No admission tests or transcripts are required and any high school graduate or person over 18 years of age may attend.

Highway Patrol Seeks Reduction Of Auto Thefts

The California Highway Patrol is stepping up its efforts to reduce auto thefts and to increase recovery of stolen cars, Patrol Commissioner Bradford M. Crittenden said this week.

"The California Department of Justice's records show that more than 50,000 vehicles were stolen in California during each of the past two years," Crittenden said. "These thefts cost the people of California more than any other form of crime. Our goal is to help reduce this loss to our motorists."

Special training of all patrol traffic officers is under way to increase their efficiency in recognizing stolen cars, and in conducting investigations in cases where the officers suspect a car has been stolen. This training is designed to speed the recovery of stolen cars as well as to apprehend the thieves. Representatives of the National Auto Theft Bureau are assisting the patrol in conducting the training program.

Supporting the enforcement will be a public education program designed to help motorists protect their vehicles from theft.

"The auto theft problem is not merely a police problem. It is one in which every car owner has a stake," Crittenden said. "If motorists would learn not to leave their keys in their cars, thefts would be reduced considerably."
