BOAT PRECAUTIONS

Some 40 million people will take to the water this year in pleasure boats. The American Medical Association stresses certain basic precautions that all boaters should know and observe. Among them are these: Don't overload the craft. Don't stand up or change seats while the boat is underway. Watch your wake - waves can cause damage. Avoid boating too close to swimmers, fishermen and water skiers. Don't jump or dive from a moving boat. Be sure everyone aboard wears a life jacket. Don't venture too far from shore. And if your boat overturns, stay with it until you're picked
