We feel that every effort should be

made to bring the culprit to justice. We ask the public to join with us in contributing additional money toward the reward. There is no price too high to pay for the capture of a man who would molest a youngster.

Parents are frantic in Torrance and surrounding areas. There is a general uneasiness which cannot be put to rest by reassurance. A criminal has struck twice within a year. He must be found, or another child could meet a similar

and Orange County are doing everything possible to check out facts, and screen sexual deviats and known child molesters, However, as late as yesterday morning, there was no new evidence. Even though it seemed at times the criminal would be caught momentarily, the trail finally lead to a dead

The only positive suggestion that can be given to parents is to redouble their efforts to keep their children out

Unfortunately, keeping children away from strangers is not enough. Police Chief Percy Bennett believes Gale (as the murdered girl was known) was abducted and killed by someone she knew.

There's only one answer: Catch the murderer and serve notice on all perverts that Torrance is an unhealthy center for their operation.


Sadly enough, Gale is dead and Karen Tompkins, who disappeared a

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
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# SERVICES TO BE HELD TOMORROW FOR 11-YEAR-OLD MURDER VICTIM
