Guild Sponsors Events For Expectant Mothers

Happier mothers and better care for babies is the objective of an Expectant Mother's Tea program which has been in existence at the Bay Harbor Hospital for the past two years. More than 300 expectant mothers have attended the hospital sessions sponsored by the Bay Harbor Hospital Guild.

The program under the direction of Mrs. Olin Grubbs of Harbor City, required cooperation of doctors and patients and had to be built up gradually.

Expectant mothers were invited to the special teas, where representatives of baby food manufacturers present films showing mothers what to do during pregnancy and how to care for and feed their babies after they arrive.

CREDIT FOR PROGRAM

"Much of the credit for the success of our program is due to Mrs. Ruth Burke of Long Beach, representative of the H. J. Heinz Co. who not only presents the film but provides door prizes, favors and gifts at the tea sessions," Mrs. Richard Rosenzall of Torrance, current chairman of the tea meetings, said.

Touts of the maternity section of the hospital familiarize expectant mothers with the facilities of the obstetrical ward, delivery room and with hospital procedure. This makes the patient more at ease when the baby arrives, according to doctors and nurses who have studied the program.

BRIEFING

The expectant mothers are also briefed on hospital entrance requirements, financial arrangements and other procedures so that there are no items left to worry about when the event takes place.

The sessions are held in the library at the hospital, 1437 Lomita Blvd., Harbor City every two months. Obstetrical nurses and Mrs. Josephine Mitchell, superintendent of nurses, take an important part in the "education" of the expectant mothers, according to Mrs. Louise Smith, president of the guild.

A final summer Expectant Mothers Tea was staged at the hospital July 5 and another has been scheduled for Sept. 6.

Teen-Age Republicans Slate All-Day Picnic


The Teenage Republicans of Torrance met June 30 for an all-day picnic to Wheeler Springs.
