Hundreds **Attend** Ceremony

TORRANCE — Ceremonies dedicating 4.6 miles of the San Diego Freeway were held Friday, with Gov. Edmund G. (Pat) Brown officiating and primising an early - September opening

Although originally scheduled for public opening immediately after the ceremony, last-minute lighting and sign work has delayed the opening approximately two weeks.

On hand for Friday's dedication were dignitaries representing 11 South Bay communities, two county supervisors and officials of the State Highway Department. An estimated 250 persons attended.

A Good Job Well Done

(An Editorial)

That adage about "too many cooks" doesn't always hold true.

Sometimes, the more cooks with their fingers in the pie, the quicker the pie gets done.

That is what has happened in the case of the San Diego Freeway, a portion of which was dedicated Friday in Torrance.

Members of the Intercity Highway Committeethe "cooks" in this case—finally have won their hardfought campaign for early completion of the freeway.

They successfully argued that South Bay motorists vitally need fast-and safe-access to and from their jobs. They obtained a promise that the freeway would be started and finished two years ahead of schedule, a pledge which was partially fulfilled

When a group of community representatives met informally nine years ago, they scarcely imagined their destiny. Still, they voted a bond of inter-city cooperation for the achievement of common goals.

In the years that ensued, 11 Torrance-area committees joined the Intercity Highway Committee. City councils each authorized one member as an official representative, and the group gained official sanction.

When it appeared some months ago that plans for a vehicle underpass at Rosecrans Ave. and Aviation Blvd. were bogged down, the Intercity Highway Committee made a plea to the county, the state and the federal government. Today, the underpass is near

When committee members learned that 1965 was the anticipated completion date for the San Diego Freeway, they again went to bat.

Today the freeway, too, is nearer reality.

Although their campaign took them six times before the State Highway Commission, committee members fought discouragement. Despite delays, setbacks and outright turndowns, they pressed for an acceptable construction schedule. The highway commission finally agreed.

And so on Friday, the state made good its promise. Not only did it announce completion of a 4.6 mile stretch of freeway here, but it pledged that work on the entire superhighway from Ventura to Signal Hill would be completed by April, 1963,

Thus, it is with great pride that we look toward the Intercity Highway Committee and its president, Torrance Councilman J. A. Beasley.

We wish them continued success in their fight for better motoring. We send them well-deserved and hard-earned congratulations for a job well done. In short, we send them our heartfelt vote of

The suspect, now being held by police, is Joyce Arlene Gilbert, 35, wife of Leo Gilbert, 1860 Torrance Blvd.

According to hospital officials, Gilbert is in fair condition and is suffering from three knife wounds. He was stabbed with a five or sixinch kitchen knife.

Mrs. Gilbert told police that she and her husband began arguing at 11 a.m. and her husband struck her several times and rifled through her purse.

Then, Mrs. Gilbert said, she went into the kitchen and picked up a knife and returned to stab him. "The . . didn't believe I'd do it. But I did and I hope the . . dies," she told officers at the
