WHY TORRANGE NEEDS MORE SCHOOL BONDS

COMMUNITY GROWTH, such as that experienced in Torrance, is a wonderful thing -but it does have its problems, too.

One of our community's most pressing problems is that of providing our youngsters with adequate schools so they may learn to read and write . . . to become good Americans.

A resaonable estimate by the Torrance Planning Commission shows that by 1970 we will need an additional 120 classrooms, or the equivalent of six new schools for over 4,000 new elementary pupils, and about 140 classrooms for more than 4,000 new high school students.


Approximately \$8 million is needed to carry the building program for the next four years. Bonds provide building funds at a low rate of interest and are paid off over a 20 to 25-year period. Thus, new residents assume their share of the cost of school buildings as they acquire property in the district.

Remember, the current tax rate will not be affected. Torrance is bonded to capacity now (10 per cent of assessed valuation) and the new bond authorization will simply keep it at that

We think the School bond issue is a good thing for the city and we support the Torrance Board of Education recommendation for a "YES" vote.
