EDITORIALS: New Brand of Justice?

Because a man is innocent until proven guilty, our court system generally bends over backward to assure justice.

But it seems to have gone a little far recently in a case heard at Inglewood Superior Court.

A man is arrested. He is questioned, charged and tried. His crime: two counts of burglary, a felony. State law provides that he may be sentenced to a term from one to five years in prison.

And now comes the punch line:

This "special" burglar is sentenced to serve three weekends in Torrance City Jail.

No one can say the man received preferential treatment because one of his relatives is held in high regard in this city.

No one can claim there was any bargaining between judge and attorneys.

But the case does arouse curiousity. It does make a legitimately concerned police department even more concerned.

And although our court system must, by necessity, lean strongly toward the defendant to insure that justice is served, it seems this type of sentencing goes farther to injure our judicial system.

We hope this brand of "justice" is not an everyday occurrance.

★ 'Who Needs Facts? We're Confused'

They didn't really come to seek an answer. They didn't come to present a solution. They didn't come to ask questions. Their minds were made up - they were determined not to be confused with the facts.

These angry residents came before school board members Monday to complain and to exercise emotions in need of a whipping boy.

They came to insult and to threaten board members

Their complaint concerned absence of school bus service within a two-mile radius of South High School.

One angry woman complained she suffered from the flu "all last year" because she had to cart her child, a South High coed, to school daily.

Another citizen complained bitterly that when it rains his children have to "swim" to school. "We need sidewalks on these stretches where there are no homes," he asserted.

Board members suggested a solution. They asked parents to attend a City Council meeting and request city buses to service the area. They explained that school buses are being used to capacity - that there
