

Nero Trio Stars at Camino 'Evening in Jazz' Concert

El Camino College will present "An evening in Jazz" concert with the Nero Trio Sept. 25 in the women's gymnasium at 8:30 p.m. Hamilton Maddaford, assistant director of student personnel, announced this week.

Nero, a piano recording artist for RCA Victor, is noted for his albums "Piano-forte," "New Piano in Town" and others. "Pianist Peter Nero's playing creates an aura of electricity," critics say.

The 28-year-old Nero has met with "unusual critical success" at many famous show places, including the Las Vegas Sands and Tropicana Hotels.

New York-born Nero started playing the piano at seven. At 14 he had won several contests, made symphony hall appearances, and won a Juilliard School of Music scholarship. At 17 he started playing popular music and studying composition at Juilliard and Brooklyn College.

At 19, Nero won his break into music by placing first on Arthur Godfrey's "Talent Scouts" program. He then won first place on "Paul Whiteman's TV Teen Club" and went on with Paul Whiteman to appear in a series of nationwide television and personal appearance programs.

The Jazz Concert is sponsored by the El Camino College Associated Students and is open to the public. Tickets are now on sale at the student store for \$1.50 and \$2. There will be no reserved seats.

"Slower speeds and a lot more caution are necessary. Remember, too, that youngsters often forget about automobiles, especially during the early days of the school year. They may run from behind parked cars, or zoom from driveways on bikes."

"Be particularly watchful in and near school zones, where children may be alighting from buses or cars," the commissioner said.

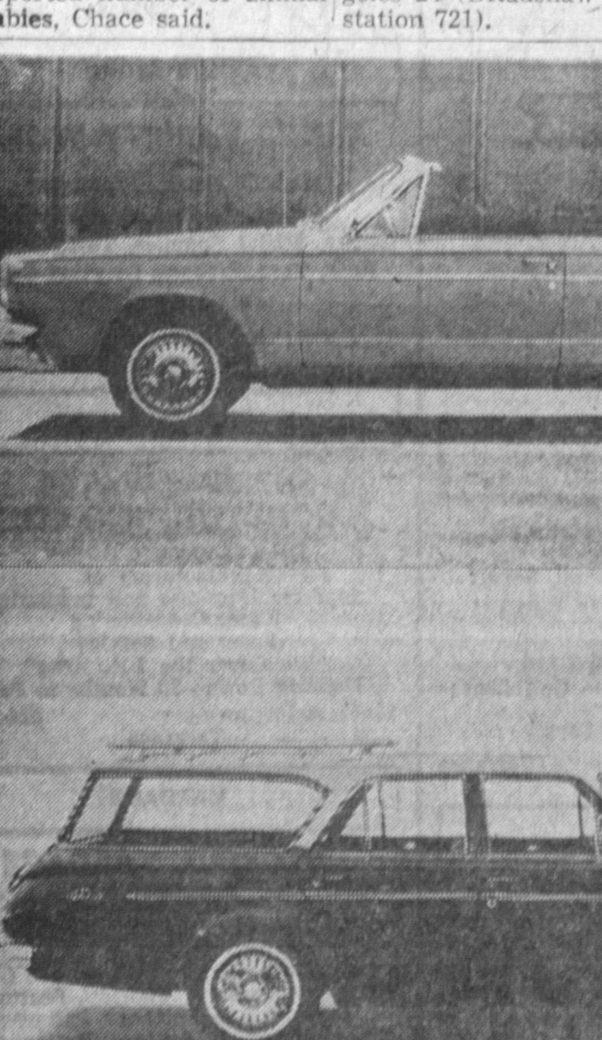
"In the lectures, a group of specialists will analyze the various art styles of these peoples and the relationship of their art to the particular periods, cultures and areas in which they lived," he said.
