.35 Homes Robbed in . Theft Spree

TORRANCE - Police have stepped up their search for a marauding "cat burglar," believed responsible for 35 thefts totalling more than \$1500.

Det. Lt. Don Hamilton said the burglar has hit an estimated 20 homes in North Torrance and approximately

15 in the Riviera section. All thefts have occurred while the occupants slept, Hamilton said.

The occupants have awakened and chased the burglar on at least two occasions, Hamilton said, but both attempts at apprehension were unsuccessful.

According to his victims, the suspect enters homes through unlocked doors and loots undisturbed.

"He's even walked into the bedrooms where a man and wife were sleeping," said Hamilton.

Police patrols have been increased in the areas, according to Hamilton, but there thus far has been no clue to the suspect's pattern of operation.


