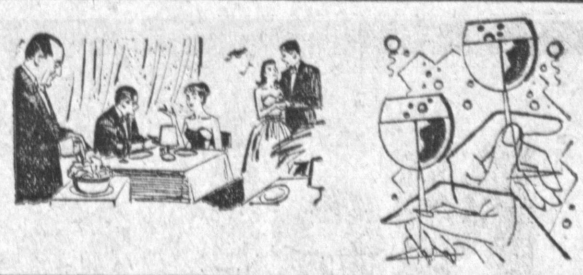

## Human Relations Group Sponsors Theater Benefit

The Centinela-Bay Human Relations Committee is sponsoring a special benefit performance of "Purle Victorious" at the Players Ring Gallery, 8324 Santa Monica Blvd., Hollywood, on Thursday night, Dec. 6.

The Theatre Party is in observance of Human Rights Day. Human Rights Day is December 10, and marks the opening of Human Rights Week (Dec. 10-17), which our Presidents, for a number of years, have urged the Nation to honor with manifestations of support for the principles embodied in the great "Universal Declaration of Human Rights."

## Dickens Play Picked for Camino Repeat

El Camino College's theater arts department will present, as the first part of El Camino's annual Christmas festival of Arts program, Charles Dickens' play "A Christmas Carol" in the Campus Theater, Dec. 7 at 7:30; Dec. 8 at 10:30, 2:30 and 7:30, and Dec. 9 at 2:30 p.m.

Dickens' play, adapted and directed by drama instructor Howard Banks, tells the traditional Christmas story of the transition of Scrooge from a miser to a gift-giving, joyful harbinger of Christmas cheer.

"Reality for the play will be heightened by the use of a back projector, which flashes a picture on to the back of a screen, making scene changes quicker and easier," Banks added.

Also helping to make the 13 different scene changes will be a double wagon stage. While one part of the rolling stage is being used, the other one will be in the wings being changed for the next scene.

Characters in the play will be portrayed by El Camino College students. Scrooge will be played by Victor Nastasia; Bob Cratchet, Don Brown; Marley, Arnold Rosenfeld; The Ghost of Christmas Past, Barbara Geienne; Fezziwig, James Wilson; Christmas Present, Clinton Jones; Tiny Tim, Michael Walker; and the Ghost of Christmas Yet to Come by Irene Ballenger.

Singing traditional Christmas carols as part of the production will be a mixed quartet directed by Jane Skinner, music instructor.

Tickets for the play are now on sale in the El Camino student store for 75 cents, seats will be reserved.
