News Of Servicemen

Torrance men in the armed services of the United States are dotted around the world in various posts of duty. Among those The Press has word from recently include:

Lt. Col. William E. Ryan Jr., 39, of the Army, who is attending the associate course at The Command and General Staff College, Fort Leavenworth, Kans.

The 18-week course that the colonel is taking will end May 10 and is designed to prepare selected officers for duty as commanders and general staff officers as division, corps, and field Army levels.

In addition to U.S. Army officers, those of 14 allied nations are attending the course.

Col. Ryan entered the Army in 1943, and attended Compton College before joining. He is the son of Mrs. Dolores M. Frodyma, 23022 Meyler Ave., Torrance.

In Worms, Germany, Earl E. Felder, son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Felder, 943 1/2 E. 220th St., Torrance, has been promoted to Specialist Four. He is assigned to the 48th Infantry, as a mechanic in the headquarters company.

Specialist Fedder joined the Army in March, 1953, and arrived overseas on this tour of duty, April, 1962. His wife, Betty, is with him in Germany.

Also in Germany—Stuttgart—Gerald V. Breedlove was promoted to Specialist Four in the 47th Ordnance Group. He entered the Army in Oct., 1961, and completed his basic training in Fort Ord, Calif.

He is 24, and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Victor E. Breedlove, of 22532 Leyte Dr., Torrance. In 1956, he graduated from Torrance High.

As part of Battery A, of the 43rd Artillery's Third Missile Battalion, John C. Willis took part in a one-week missile firing practice at the McGregor Guided Missile Range in New Mexico.

That fleet maintains the naval vessels which are in "mothballs." Ships not needed on active duty are placed in a semi-retired status and maintained in the event they may be needed in a national emergency.

The squadron has completed another season as "Typhoon Hunters." It tracks storms throughout the Western Pacific, and located 25 typhoons, four more than the previous record in 1958.
